BURWASH, of Victoria College, Toronto, one of the leading educationalists in Canada said some time ago, in speaking of this institution that it was the best all around educational institution of the kind in Canada. There is nothing in the Maritime Provinces to approach it. While there are institutions which furnish a literary education to young ladies, there is not one that possesses the facilities to impart a literary, a musical or an art education equal to Mr. Allison. Shooting Match.

At Brookfield on Wednesday Aug. 23rd a very interesting and closely contested team match took place. The teams were composed of six men from No. 5 82nd Battalion and six men not belonging to the Co., terming themselves the rough riders. Captain Beaton had charge of the No. 5 team while the Rough Riders were ably led by Mr. Richard McDuff.

Although the weather was unfavorable the scoring was fairly good.

The ranges fired at were 200 and 500 yards—five rounds at each range.

At the first range the Co's team led by sixteen points. A deeper interest was manifested at the 500 yards when it was found that the opposing team was gradually gaining. At the close the scores stood 180 points for each thus giving the Rough Riders the victory, having made the highest score at the long range.
