THE POLITICAL SITUATION.

The possible appointment, to use no stronger term, of Attorney General McDonald to the vacant judgeship opens up the question of who is to succeed him in his present position. If Mr McDonald goes out a new Attorney General must be found and he must seek re-election by the votes of his constituents. Behind this lies the other question, whether it may not be found desirable to make at the same time a more considerable reconstruction of the provincial Executive. A considerable reconstruction was hinted at last year among the knowing ones, and a date was fixed at which two of the ministers holding portfolios were to go out and two supporters were to be promoted. For some reason the plan either fell through, or its execution was delayed, for all of which THE GUARDIAN has heard various reasons assigned.

Just now it has been intimated that the unreadiness of the provincial Government has been one of the causes that have delayed the filling up of the judicial vacancy, and has also to some extent stood in the way of Mr. McDonald's appointment. Be that as it may the Executive is understood to have been considering what is to be done in the event of that appointment being made very shortly.

If the election of an Attorney General is to be made from within the party as now represented in the House, there are just two names to be considered, those of Messrs Arthur, Peters and D. A. McKinnon. Of these Mr. Peters is the senior in years, at the bar and in political service. Both these gentlemen had good majorities in the election of 1897, and unless their party has since lost ground would be fairly secure of re-election. Mr. Peters had a majority of 125 over his opponent Mr. Morson at last election, and Mr. McKinnon was returned by a majority of 70 over Mr. A. P. Prowse.

If some ground has been lost, the prestige of a good cabinet position would doubtless do something to make amends. There are other considerations, however. Mr. Peters' colleague, Mr. A. McLaughlin, since last year if not longer, has indulged a hope of becoming the new Minister of Agriculture when that office is called into existence and might not take kindly to having his hopes nipped in the bud by a June frost. Two portfolios could hardly be allotted to the same electoral district and if Mr. Peters becomes Attorney General Mr. McLaughlin must wait. Mr. Peters has, however, been recently fishing in the long neglected waters of his constituency, with what results we know not.

THE GUARDIAN is not fully in the confidence of the Government, which is no doubt unfortunate for that body. But that fact will not prevent the expression of our opinion that if one new portfolio is to be filled there ought to be a general reconstruction of the cabinet, bringing in with the new Attorney General a Commissioner of Agriculture and a new Commissioner of Public Works. The reconstruction, expected months ago, has been too long delayed.

A number of gentlemen who take a public spirited interest in civic affairs have expressed approval of THE GUARDIAN'S suggestion for improving the surroundings of Government Pond and it is to be hoped that the City Fathers may be induced to give the matter their serious consideration. There is no doubt that the great improvements made in the approach to the Park by the construction of the Boulevard has tended to make the Pond and its surroundings more un-

slightly by contrast than they were before. Whatever can be done at reasonable cost to beautify the city will always be money well spent.

Two New Orleans ladies, Mrs Pauline Costa Langles and her daughter, perished in the Burgogne steamship disaster. Both ladies left wills, disposing of an estate valued at about \$200,000. In the settlement of the estate the peculiar question arose, which of the two women died first? No one now living saw them die. It became necessary to decide which died first because the legatees named in the two wills were different. The judge of the court before whom the matter came for decision held that the younger woman, being probably the stronger would naturally live longer, the presumption being that both were thrown into the water at the same time.

It is five years now since the first installment of children from the Middlemore Emigration Homes landed on P. E. I., and as the yearly emigration is now an established occurrence. A few words concerning the children and the Home they come from, will no doubt be appreciated by GUARDIAN readers. An impression is prevalent among both town and country people, that the children are connected with Dr. Barnardo's Emigration Homes, either directly or indirectly. This is not the case. Dr. Barnardo's proteges come from London and the surrounding districts, while those of the Middlemore Emigration Homes, are from Bramingham, sent from under the care and guardianship of Mr. Middlemore himself and his assistants. Mr. Middlemore being the founder and originator of the Institution named after him. Mr. M. has recently been elected a Member of Parliament. He began his work as a rescuer of children from environments not conducive to their moral or spiritual advancement, some years ago; and year by year has the work increased, until now the demand for children from his homes greatly exceeds the supply. Another impression about his work which is most incorrect may here be done away with. He never allows any proselytizing of children in religious matters. Roman Catholic children are settled in R. C. homes, Protestants in Protestant homes in every instance. The contingent sent to the Island this year are very superior children and should make welcome inmates to the various homes; in return for those homes they will if taken in the right way, give the best that health and strength has to offer, the labor of heart and hands. They are healthy, bright boys and girls, affectionate in no ordinary sense of the word, and already six have gone to homes that have been waiting for them since notice was given in early spring of their arrival. The applications have been filled in order as they came, and the agent here, Mrs Hogg as well as the general agent in Halifax, Mr. J. S. Bough, regret their being obliged to hold so many applications over until next year. The names of those settled and their homes are as follows:

It may be said in conclusion that not one of the children from these homes has ever become notorious through bad behavior. A very small percentage of them have been returned to England, and not more than five per cent have proved hard to manage. To "clothe the naked, feed the hungry, and home the homeless," has ever been the highest charity. And it will never harm any one to remember the words "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these My little ones, ye have done it unto Me."
