Capt. (Rev.) G. C. Taylor in replying to Taylor then proceeded to outline something of the big part taken by the Canadian Corps in the Great War. His address was featured by numerous jolly anecdotes of the days in England and France which brought many a hearty laugh—though at the time in question the events related were no laughing matter. He traced the fighting for Hill 70, Paschendale, etc., and the wonderful achievements of the Canadians, whose other names had fallen and took the boys back in memory through the strenuous attacks on the Hindenburg and Drocourt-Queant line to Arras, Monchy, Bourlon Wood, Cambrai and down into Bonne and Cologne. Many of these battles would go down in his story alongside of such triumphs of the past as Balaclava and Inkerman. Captain Taylor concluded his excellent speech amid applause with the following lines:—

"And these have said, thy sons, When thou art mightier yet, No man shall point at thee, none shall dare say

When in the war of worlds, Cruelty and Justice met, The men of the Maple Leaf held back from the fray."

WOMEN MUST BE GIVEN EQUAL RIGHTS WITH MEN

OTTAWA, Jan. 19.—Addressing the members of the National Council of Women at their meeting here this afternoon, Hon. N. W. Rowell, president of the Privy Council dealt with the Washington conference and its relation to women's work. He said that the movement for the extension of the franchise had made such progress that all democratic countries must extend to women the right to vote and occupy seats in parliament on the same basis as men.

Mr. Rowell paid a tribute to the importance of the work of the National Council of Women in question of public health.

two points. The first is the validity of its organization as a court of justice, since the organization of such courts belongs to the federal government. The second point concerns the fixing of prices, since prices are part of a contract and contracts are part of the civil law.

The Board points out in its submission that it has already rendered a number of decisions in the past by which it was created, and will continue to do so, but that in view of the importance of the issues involved, it desires to have its legal position clearly defined before proceeding further.

All persons affected by the decisions so far rendered by the Board have been invited to appear at the hearing and the attorney-generals of several provinces have also received copies of the Board's submission with invitations to intervene if they so desire.

Must Join Reds Or Suffer Death

ROME, Jan. 21.—Russian prisoners returning to Russia from enemy prison camps are obliged to allow the Bolshevik army on the penalty of death, according to the Polish Government, which has replied to a question sent to it by the Vatican. The Polish authorities made this reply after the Vatican had asked the Polish Government to allow Russian prisoners still in Germany to pass through Poland for repatriation. Because the Russian prisoners who refused to join the Soviet army are shot, the Polish Government says it would suggest that the repatriation of the prisoners be postponed until the Soviet Government reverses its policy.

FLOUR DROPS IN UNITED STATES

(Special to The Guardian.) MINNEAPOLIS, Jan. 21.—Flour dropped fifty cents a barrel in the local market today. Standard flour in 98-pound cotton sacks sold at \$14.25 a barrel. The general market decline in wheat was given as the reason for the drop.

Storm Severe in Nova Scotia

KENTVILLE, N. S., Jan. 21.—The storm of Saturday and Sunday was exceptionally severe in the Valley, as well as along the south shore of the Bay of Fundy. The main highways are practically impassable and roads leading from the valley to points on the shore of the Bay of Fundy will probably be buried for an entire week. Fortunately the cold was not severe.

AN INFANT, TWO BOTTLES OF MILK, TALCUM POWDER

BRIDGE PORT, Conn., Jan. 19.—After bringing home a black leather bag not his own, Robert F. Rohland, arriving from New York City today, found in it an eight weeks' old infant, two bottles of milk and a package of talcum powder. As Mr. Rohland read in a smoking car he believes that the exchange of black bags was made. The infant suffered no ill effects from the trip.
