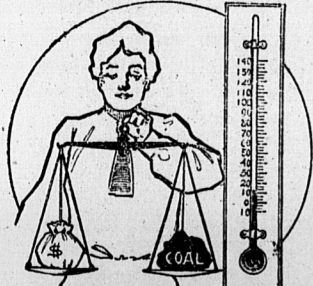

CHARLOTTETOWN AND QUEEN'S COUNTY

It pays to buy in this Province A large number will accompany the Victorias to Summerside for the game tomorrow night. The special leaves at 3.45 p.m.

W. T. Ritch, one of the Commissioners appointed to enquire into the sheep industry in Canada, is expected to speak on this subject at Tracadie Cross on Feb. 1st, at Grand River, Lot 14, on Feb. 2nd, and at Georgetown on Feb. 3rd. The report of the Commission has been very highly spoken of, and all farmers within reasonable distance of these places should make it a point to hear Mr. Ritch.

According to New Glasgow papers the "Cubs" should win every game as they have the best team. Many are inclined to doubt the statement that they have the best team. It is rumored that a change has been made in the management of the "Cubs." The reports say that Chester Gregory (formerly of this city) has been appointed manager and Rocket Powder captain.

In all the Presbyterian and Methodist churches in the near future, says an Amherst exchange, a vote will be taken on the important question of a union of these churches in Canada and the Congregational church of the Dominion. Rev. Dr. Heartz was a member of the joint committee that formulated the basis of union. (The First Methodist Church in Charlottetown has received the ballots and they will be mailed to the members of the congregation to be returned shortly.)

A. W. Robb, local secretary of the Y. M. C. A., returned Saturday from Truro (N. S.), where he was in attendance at the convention of the maritime board. The board, he said, approved of the suggestion of making the association a national board. A convention is to be held in Winnipeg in the near future. In the meantime before the idea is brought into force it must be submitted to the branches of the association, and it is expected that probably about the last of February a one-day maritime convention will be held to discuss the matter. St. John Exc. (Mr. Robb was formerly secretary of the Y. M. C. A., here.)

The Madame Sherry Company closed their brief engagement at the Academy of Music on Saturday night and the Company has disbanded. As a result fifteen members of the Company are practically stranded. Some of the principals and the higher salaried members of the Company left by train last night, but the others owing to their financial circumstances are not able to leave the City. Of the number left behind six are female members of the chorus and they have no friends in the City. Some of them will today seek brief engagements with the managers of the local moving picture houses, and if successful they hope to be able to earn sufficient money by singing to pay their way to their homes. (Hall-fax Exc. (This company performed here some time ago and created a favorable impression.)

Miss Katherine Hughes will relinquish her duties as private secretary to Premier Sifton for the coming six or seven months to permit her to take a trip to Honolulu. She has been in very poor health for some time past and is compelled to take this Pacific ocean trip. Miss Hughes expects to leave here on Saturday for Vancouver, from where she will sail at once for the Pacific islands. Her friends are solicitous for her health and have been wishing her a pleasant and profitable trip. Her recently published book, a biography of Father Lacombe, has been accorded a great deal of praise by reviewers everywhere. It is said to be a delightful work, giving an intimate account of early days in this part of the west. Miss Hughes is understood to be writing a novel now.—Edmonton Journal. (Miss Hughes is a native of this province.)

Rev. Dr. C. R. Flanders, pastor of Centenary church, St. John, has received an invitation to be present tomorrow at the organization of the Men and Religion Movement in Canada to be held at Toronto. This movement started in the United States, has had tremendous success and after the Canadian organization is completed, St. John will likely be included in the campaign. The Men and Religion Movement is a new conception of the work of the church in that it reaches all classes and takes cognizance of social problems, its leaders advocating an alliance with trade unionism in the effort to better the condition of the workers in the cities. A campaign has been in progress in Boston for some weeks and has led to conflict between the regular pastors of the city and those in charge of the campaign, the former charging that they have been unduly criticized by the speakers at the public meetings. Dr. Flanders is unable to attend the Toronto meeting, but he hopes to see the movement started in St. John's Exc. (Dr. Flanders is well known here and will assume charge of the First Methodist Church here this year.)

Looking back over the egg year of '11, says an exchange, we cannot say that it was satisfactory. The great heat during the summer caused the deterioration of goods to a great extent, and trade dropped off greatly. The consequence was that merchants faced larger quantities in cold storage only to make a further loss later on. The full trade which is generally expected to bring a profit was disappointing. Supplies from Russia and the weather hit our egg trade hard. We are expecting a shortage of eggs for some time. At present, owing to the short supplies coming forward, and the steady decrease in stocks, a stronger feeling has developed on the market, and eggs are better by 1c. at Montreal and Toronto. Demand good on an active market.

A recent issue of the London (Eng) Globe says:—Many times are the political union of Canada and the West Indies has been discussed of late years, it has once again come up, and this time in more practical form. Instead of all the British West Indian islands uniting with Canada at the same time, an inspiration which has proved impossible of fulfillment—it is suggested that the Bahamas group shall pave the way and others may then follow. The Bahamas are not very wealthy or very prosperous, and their social conditions have not always been too happy. Of late years there has been some improvement, and the islands are increasingly used as health resorts; but they are considerably less populous than Prince Edward Island, the smallest of the Canadian provinces. That, however, is no valid reason why they should unite with Canada and gain the advantage from her growing strength. One difficulty in regard to the other islands, if not the Bahamas, may be constitutional. Many of the West Indies are crown colonies, and unless the popular element is increased—a matter of some difficulty in view of the conditions of the population they would have rather an anomalous position as members of the Canadian Confederation. The Bahamas, which with Barbadoes and Bermudas, retain the full machinery of popular election, would not feel this difficulty; but as regards most of the other colonies, it appears to be curious to see how far the movement progresses.

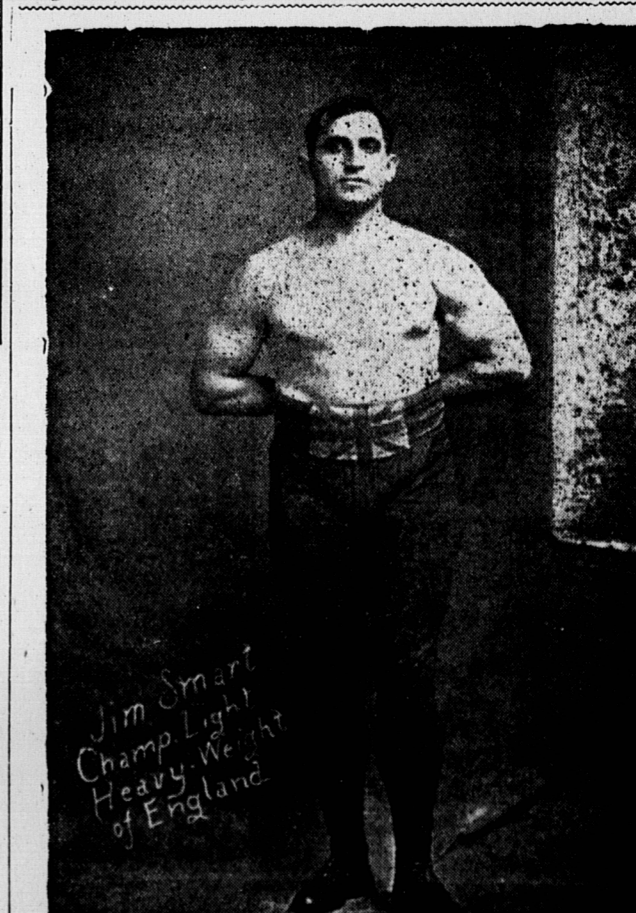
