THE UNITED STATES WANTS WAR-SHIPS ON THE GREAT LAKES

Scheme is to Convene Joint High Commission and, Also, Get Existing Treaty Reversed-Which Prohibits Any Naval Force on Inland Waters.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.-Fresh water sailors, recruited from the vast middle west and trained on the great lakes, promise to become a highly important factor in the United States navy of the future. To aid in their development, there is a strong feeling in Washington that the Rush-Bagot treaty of 1817, which limits to almost nothing the naval force of Great Britain and the United States on the great lakes, should be so revised, or its interpretation so agreed upon, that warships suitable for training purposes may be permitted to cruise the great inland seas.

A board, consisting of Rear Admiral Taylor, chief of the bureau of navigation, and Commander C. McR. Winlow, has recommended that the naval training station be located at Lake Blue, thirty-two miles north of Chicago, on the shore of Lake Michigan. There is an excellent site there for the erection of shore barracks and a drill ground, and it possesses a first-rate harbor where the recruits may

be trained in ships' cutters. But this is the limit for training facilities on such water unless the Rush-Bagot agreement is altered.

There have been in the past many efforts to abrogate the Rush-Bagot treaty. Shipbuilders on the lakes desired its abrogation in order that they might build warships for the navy which could be taken to the sea through the St. Lawrence river.

Senator Fairbanks is anxious that the sitings of the joint high commission, which failed several years ago to satisfactorily adjust existing differences between the United States and Canada, shall be resumed. If he is able to bring this about, the Rush-Bagot treaty will be brought before the commission with an idea to its revision or interpretation anew.

The naval committee of the house, which will consider the establishing of the training station on Lake Michigan at an early date will also consider the necessity for change in the existing agreement.

THE DOMINION ELECTIONS IN SIX WEEKS

OTTAWA, Nov. 17.-The Free Press Government organ, today announced that the election will take place within six weeks. It says frankly this is the first move to clean out the political stable.

Mr. Blair had an interview with Sir Wilfrid Laurier today. The opinion gains ground that Blair will be chairman of the railway commission in a few days. It is reported that Bernier, Minister of Inland Revenue, will exchange positions with Beauvois, postmaster of Montreal, and that the latter will run against Tarte in Berthier. Mr. Tarte however

will win that constituency as well as the St. Mary's Division of Montreal, where he will also run.

MONTREAL, November 17.-Hon. Raymond Prefontaine, minister of marine and fisheries, addressing the De Laframboise club this evening, stated the cabinet was now considering the question of holding the general elections. Voter's lists were being prepared, but it had not yet been decided whether or not another session of the present house would be held. He cautioned the club to be prepared for the elections, whether they came in six weeks or six months.

ROSEBERY IS IN THE SADDLE AGAIN

LONDON, Nov. 18.-Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman addressed a large Liberal meeting yesterday. His significant point was the welcome accorded Lord Rosebery's expressed intention of returning to public life. He said it would be the cordial satisfaction of every man among us to hear that Lord Rosebery was ready to share the labor and responsibilities of public life in active co-operation with a united Liberal party. This indeed was good news to all, as all true Liberals would welcome his appeal for unity
