DUBLIN, July 6.—In view of the importance and delicacy of the situation of those concerned in the peace movement it was decided that reticence was the best policy, consequently aside from the fact that General Jan Christian Smuts, South African premier, arrived and held private conversations with certain Irish leaders there is virtually nothing known by the general public as to how matters are progressing. Everybody is talking peace and rumors, that a truce is about to begin, are current everywhere but neither side has issued any statement.

Track Record Goes In Grand Circuit

GRAND CIRCUIT, NORTH RAN-DALL, CLEVELAND, OHIO, July 5.—The grand circuit horse racing season of 1921 was inaugurated at North Randall today under the most auspicious conditions. Close finishes, fast time and one of the largest first day crowds marked the opening.

One track record went by the boards. In winning the Edwards' stake for 2.08 pacers, the feature event on today's card, Prince Loree; the double gaited champion of the world, paced the second heat in 2.02 1/2, half a second faster than the previous record for the stake. The last quarter was covered in 30 1/2 seconds, a full second faster than the first.

The winner is owned by Captain David Shaw, of Cleveland, and was driven by Mike McDevitt. Summary:

CANADIAN TREES FOR BRITISH FORESTS

The demand for timber during the war aroused interest in Great Britain in the subject of forestry. It was seen that even in the thickly populated Motherland there were very considerable areas which would give a greater return in growing trees than if handled in any other way. In fact, as forest-ers have been pointing out for years, many areas cannot be made to produce anything but trees. The British Forestry Commission have undertaken a programme of planting and seeding these. It has been found that certain Canadian trees do well in the British Isles, and through the Forestry Branch of the Department of the Interior, a quantity of tree seeds has been collected and forwarded for sowing on certain areas. These shipments have been sent for several years in succession and have amounted to as much as half a ton in a year. The trees most favored in this connection are Douglas fir and Sitka spruce and a recent visitor to England reports the plantations of these species as doing remarkably well. Some consignments of Canadian tree seeds have also been sent to Belgium to help restore the devastated forests of that country.

That the holder of a check cannot render the maker liable, should the bank on which it is drawn fail, if he has neglected to present it for payment within a short time after receiving it?
That, except in four states, the holder of a check cannot sue the bank on which it is drawn should it decline to pay, though having an ample deposit belonging to the maker?
That a purchaser in good faith of a negotiable note or check obtains a good title thereto even though the seller had stolen it?
That, unless relieved by statute or express agreement, a tenant is liable for the rent of his store after it has burned down, although he was in no way negligent?
That an agreement for the sale of land must be in writing and that the payment of a part of the purchase money will not render the agreement a writ more effective?

Jack Johnson Says Cary Is Ordinary

LEAVENWORTH, Kas., July 5. Georges Carpentier had but little chance to take the heavyweight pugilistic crown from Jack Dempsey in their contest at Jersey City July 2, in the opinion of Jack Johnson, former heavyweight champion who now is completing a term of one year in the federal penitentiary here on a white slavery conviction.

"Carpentier is just an ordinary fighter and is not capable of swapping punches with Dempsey," Johnson said today. "I have seen him box, but from what I have heard and even if he is a good second-rater he should beat Carpentier."

Johnson, weighing 230 pounds and apparently in good physical condition, will meet Harry Mills, a negro heavyweight champion, in New York on August 20. He has been guaranteed \$30,000.

Upon his release from Leavenworth at the expiration of his sentence July 7, Johnson will box several bouts in Kansas, the first of which is scheduled for Leavenworth that night, against Jack Grover of Chicago.

Dempsey Caused Row

PITTSBURGH, Pa., July 5.—John Dempsey Mahoney, the name conferred last night upon a new born son of Mr. and Mrs. John Mahoney, of Race street, following receipt of news that the American had knocked out the French Challenger, caused a row, with the result that Mahoney and his brother Gerold, a supporter of Carpentier, landed in the police station, charged with disorderly conduct.

Mahoney the younger arrived on Saturday morning, and as the father was an enthusiastic rooter for the Irish fighter, it was decided to hold off naming the baby till after the result of the Jersey City fight should be known.

"It's John Dempsey Mahoney," the exultant father told Mrs. Mahoney after getting the word: "Dempsey wins in the fourth round." But when Gerold dropped in to see his new nephew last evening his cup of bitterness overflowed. Hot words passed, and the police say that blows were struck.

At the hearing before Magistrate Wallace Borland today both the men were contrite.

"Suppose you name the baby Wallace Borland Mahoney?" suggested the magistrate hopefully.

"No, Judge," responded John, his lips tightening a bit. "It stays John Dempsey Mahoney."

"Sure it does," chimed in Gerold. "Gerold," said the magistrate, "you will buy the baby his first pair of shoes. John, you're discharged."
