HINTS FOR The Motorist

CLEANING OUT BEARINGS

It's Futile to Lubricate Dirt Filled One. After long usage, all bearings accumulate dirt which has worked in to them from outside. Fine metal particles worn from the rubbing surfaces and lubricant which has decomposed either from heat or chemical action into gummy or acid substances. This is true not only of the numerous bearings in housings, such as that of the rear axle universal joint shafts, but gearbox and the clutch case, but of the ball and roller bearings in wheel hubs, the pins used at spring ends in the steering gear and the like. Unless this grit and deteriorated oil are frequently removed, they act like abrasive compounds wearing the bearing surfaces rapidly and it is of little use to supply fresh lubricant until they have cleaned out, as they remain in the new oil or grease and continue their action. For wheel bearings the best method of cleaning is to remove them and soak them in kerosene, at the same time cleaning out the hubs thoroughly, before putting the bearings back and packing anew. For pins and other plain bearing minor parts, scraping the hubs thoroughly, before using in kerosene is effective. In the case of housing, the old lubricant should be drawn off, kerosene supplied in its place, the moving parts operated to splash it about and the kerosene drained out after standing off a time. Sometimes two washings with kerosene are required and it should be entirely removed before fresh lubricant is supplied. Sometimes the draw-off opening is not at the lowest point of a housing, but partway up its side and, in such a case, the kerosene has to be removed by sucking it out with an oil-skin, having one end of a rubber tube slipped over its nozzle, the other end being pushed through the opening to the bottom of the housing.
