TO PROTECT FORESTS IS THEIR AIM

QUEBEC, Jan. 18—The Dominion forestry convention was auspiciously opened this morning by Earl Grey before a distinguished gathering. His excellency in his opening remarks referred to the earlier conventions and the importance of the work. In the absence of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who was detained by parliamentary duties, a letter was read from the prime minister, expressing his regret at not being able to be present and also his entire sympathy with the convention. He expressed the hope that the institution would become permanent.

Hon. W. C. Edwards presided in the absence of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. A cordial welcome was extended to the convention by Sir Lomer Gouin, who said that the delegates attending the convention were the pioneers who had first discovered the forest of wealth of Canada in the province of Quebec.

"We want," said Sir Lomer Gouin, "to bequeath our natural resources to our successors, not only in the act but in the most advanced stage of development possible."

Quebec, extended the hospitality of the convention to the visitors and the support of the clergy of Quebec, was assured by His Grace Mgr. Roy, Coadjutor Bishop of Quebec, who represented Archbishop Tanguay and the Right Rev. Hunter Teller, leader of the opposition said that both sides of the house agreed on the importance and good work of the convention.

IRISH PARTY WILL STAND BY LIBERALS

DUBLIN, January 18—Today's Independent says: "The government will appoint a committee to investigate Irish finances with a view to establishing a home rule and will appoint a committee of the cabinet to frame a home rule measure."

Lord Courtney, of Penwith, has written to Thomas Saton, chairman of the Freeman's Journal company, saying that the time has come to prepare for home rule. The writer, who a liberal has been a unionist in Irish matters and heretofore opposed to home rule. In his letter he describes himself as a unionist. He proposed a plan to insure the representation of all elements in the assembly by dividing the country between two or three constituencies each to have five members and a group of constituencies each returning three members.

John E. Redmond, who was today unanimously re-elected president of the United Irish League, T. P. O'Connor, Joseph Devlin and Daniel Boyle, the Irish members of parliament who visited the United States and Canada last October for the purpose of arousing interest in the cause of

AMERICANS WITHDRAW OBJECTIONS.

OTTAWA, Jan 20—Sir A. Aylesworth has reported on the negotiations upon the Atlantic Fisheries which he and Mr. Brodeur concluded at Washington. The Americans objected to four points in the Canadian regulations—

Prohibition of purse seines.
Prohibition of Sunday fishing.
The assertion of Canada's right to board and search American fishermen suspected of a breach of the fishery regulations.
The assertion that American fishermen should be obliged to take out Canadian licenses before fishing in Canadian waters.

The Americans have withdrawn their objections in the first three cases.

The Canadians have consented to modify the Canadian license regulations. There is to be an additional regulation expressly recognizing the rights of any American citizen to obtain licenses.

Apprehension is expressed by the Maritime Province members lest the effect to be cede the use of the inshore fisheries to the Americans.

DECLARES WAR AGAINST TURKS.

ADER, Arabia, Jan 20—The Imam of Sana, Seyid Yahya, has declared war against the Turks, and armed bands are gathering in the Yemen mountains. The notorious Sheikh, Boni Basha, has joined the Imam standard, and a rising throughout Southwestern Arabia is expected.
