At any rate, they seldom change suddenly. For this reason, when an engine commences to perform badly, it is not good judgment to infer that the carburetor setting should be altered.

SPARK-INTENSIFIERS AGAIN C. R. asks: Would this use of spark-intensifiers give us a safer and larger spark on our 1913 Ford, which has the small magnet? The engine is very powerful, but hard to start, and I have had to use spark-intensifiers, although it has recently been recharged.

ANSWER: For some reason, it does not retain enough charge to fire, and we suspect this is because its exhaust valve holds open, which may be because it is prevented from seating by an overtight push-rod adjustment or because its stem sticks in its guide on account of being rough or bent.

MUST GO TO LIMIT STATED RATHENAU

MUNICH, September 29.—We must go to the limit of our capacity with regard to reparation," Dr. Walter Rathenau, the German Minister of Reconstruction, declared before the Congress of the Imperial Association of German Trades which opened today. "Complete fulfillment of the terms of the ultimatum will affect the world economically more severely than ourselves, Britain has three million and the United States six million unemployed. The more Germany must work the more the others pass working. What is needed is an international economic understanding."
