**THINKS CANADA WILL OUT-STRIP UNITED STATES**

**Col. Amory Advises Dominion Business Men Not to Imitate Policy to Development Peculiar to American Republic**

**LONDON, May 10**—About fifty Canadians doing business here attended a meeting for the promotion of a Canadian Chamber of Commerce in London, and an executive committee was appointed to complete the organization, which it is hoped will play a prominent part in developing trade relations between the mother country and the dominion. Among those included in this committee were: Lord Beaverbrook, Sir James Dunn, Colonel Hamilton, Sir George Brown and Colonel Bayly.

Colonel L. C. Amory, parliamentary and financial secretary to the admiralty, and formerly under-secretary for the colonies, addressed the meeting. He expressed the belief that Canada was destined in the fullness of time to rival if not outstrip her great neighbor, but she would not do this simply by imitating the policy of development peculiar to the American republic. Canada needed a highly developed foreign trade and if she was to realize her opportunities she must become a Greater Britain in economics as well as in politics, and not a second rate copy of the United States.

Colonel Amory said that the industries being now before the British house of commons gave to Canada more substantial customs preferences than any part of the empire had yet given the mother country.
