Chinese Christian Letter.

year. In the tenth month his people stripped his wife and children of everything, and turned them into the street; and he cannot in these times find food or work for them. Before leaving, you asked us to try and pay him at least half his salary; and this we did while Mr. Li put in all the time that he could in evangelistic work. At the first of the year we received your letter exhorting us to fulfil our duty in proclaiming the Word of the Lord; from this time Mr. Li has given his whole time to the work. He took Bibles and tracts with him, and meeting with a special favor of God, without persecution, he went everywhere preaching. In each place he found those who brought books, listened to the Gospel and asked concerning the doctrine. He felt himself moved by the Holy Spirit, and had no sense of shame or fear; nor in any place did any oppose with evil words.

The Church voted to increase their contribution toward his support to 2500 cash per month, (or a little over two dollars, all too little for his wife and children to starve on; whether he himself fasted by day and walked by night to save expenses the letter does not say) and to keep a true account of books given out and money taken in. From the beginning of this month Mr. Wang (janitor and bookseller) has been undergoing severe persecution at the hands of his father-in-law, (likely forcing him to pay heavily or give his wife the heathen honours neglected at her burial) because of this, his mother and friends hope you return quickly to strengthen him. Among the faithful enquirers are Li the farmer; Jang the teacher; Wang the stone-mason; Li the cooper and the widow Wang. Hearers, learners and church members, are watchful and diligent, each according to his knowledge, with one mind looking for Teacher to return, open the door, and preach the Gospel more full.

Will Teacher remember us to all likened in Christ, our brethren in your land; and may God the Father give grace to all; that, receiving the Holy Spirit, God may be glorified in all.
