North Wiltshire W. M. S. Rally

A Missionary Rally was held in the United Church at North Wiltshire on Wednesday, June 24th. The afternoon session, which was attended by members from seven different auxiliaries, opened at two o'clock, with Mrs. J. F. Easton presiding. Rev. L. M. Murray, on behalf of the session, welcomed the members to the church and in his remarks, stressed the need of putting first things first. He said it would be useless to win the war over seas and lose out on christi-

anity. A very impressive devotional period was conducted by members of the Bumbury auxiliary, with Mrs. Smallwood, Mrs. Tait and Mrs. Gard taking part. The address of welcome by Mrs. Mitchell of the North Wiltshire auxiliary was replied to by Mrs. Lloyd MacKinnon of the Kingston Auxiliary. The reports of the different secretaries were received and several interesting discussions were held. A very helpful message was received from the Presbyterial President, Mrs. A. J. Matheson, in which she stressed the need of finances. She quoted Dr. Fleming at the Dominion Board: "You can't be a Christian without striving to make Christ-

ians everywhere," and we must be a missionary church. The C.G.T. and Mission Circle's report by Mrs. L.M. Murray showed that the encouraging amount of \$47.00 was raised by these small groups in 1941. The Treasurer's report also showed an increase of \$400.00 for the first quarter of this year over that of the same period last year. Continued increases throughout the year are hoped for, through faith and prayer we can accomplish much. In the Associate Helpers Report, read by Mrs. Gard it was shown that splendid support is given by this department and it was hoped that more would become active members. Mrs. Geo. Kitson read the report of the Supply Secretary which also showed a large increase in the number of bales of goods sent to Labrador and the Maritime Provinces. An increase in the number of visits to homes was shown by the report of the Community Friendship secretary read by Mrs. Percy Boyle.

Mrs. Hazen Howard brought literature for all the departments which was very helpful to the secretaries. She also conducted the question box and many helpful questions were asked and answered. A discussion on Temperance resulted in a resolution being framed and sent to the Prime Minister of Canada. The following are the resolutions: (1) Whereas our country is engaged in the worst struggle of all time, and whereas the freedom of our country is being threatened, be it therefore resolved that we pledge anew our loyalty to our much beloved King and Queen. Six Lost In Halifax Accident

HALIFAX, July 1—(CP)—Rammed by an allied freighter in mid-harbour here yesterday, the Canadian National Railway's lighterage tug Lavallrie sank almost immediately with a probable loss of six lives. Only four of the tug's crew, all Nova Scotians, survived. The four and the Captain, Joseph N. Pettipas of Halifax, were picked up by a Red Cross hospital launch, but Capt. Pettipas failed to respond to artificial respiration. He also suffered severe internal injuries. After small craft had scoured the area for hours without success it was believed there was little hope any of the five missing men had survived the collision. The missing are: Havelock Gilpin, chief engineer, Amndale, N.S.; James Hodgson, fireman, Ship Harbor, N.S.; Huntley McCutcheon, Sonora, N. S.; Bill Roach, deckhand, Cheticamp N.S.
