Vegetable gardens need planning, not only for beauty, but even more for efficiency. It is amazing the amount of time and space that can be saved by sitting down in the winter, when time is plentiful, to figure out carefully just how many feet of each vegetable you grow will be required to give you family abundant food this summer; and provide enough to put in cans or into a freezer for next winter. The vegetables which require special thought are the ones which give a short harvest. They are also the earliest ones, which may begin to yield in June and July; but which for the very reason that they are early, are at their best table quality only a few short weeks. Unless you plan your sowings carefully, you are likely to have altogether too many during this first brief harvest, and then none at all, or at least too little of them. What are these short harvest vegetables? Well, snap beans, beets, carrots, cucumbers, lettuce and endive, kohlrabi, turnips, spin-

these. The French maintained it covered only Nova Scotia, whose western boundary was marked by the Missaquash river. England maintained it covered not only Nova Scotia but New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island as well and built a fort on their side, Fort Lawrence. The French, likewise, built a fort on their side of the disputed boundary, Fort Beauséjour, overlooking Cumberland Basin, at the head of the Bay of Fundy, and were harassing the English settlements of Nova Scotia, not only from this fort but from Quebec, Fort Beauséjour being the jumping-off place.

In order to enforce their claims, the British undertook a campaign to capture Fort Beauséjour, the campaign being planned by Governor Lawrence at Halifax. A force of New Englanders from Boston eventually landed in Cumberland Basin, off Fort Beauséjour, and proceeded to capture the fort, which they did in June 1755.

Due to the continual pressure being exerted by the French authorities in Quebec on the Acadians to harass the English settlements, the order for the expulsion was given in the same year the capture of Fort Beauséjour was accomplished thus sealing the fate of the Acadians in this connection. Just before the British built Fort Lawrence, orders were given the Acadians settled in Beauséjour to vacate their settlement and move to the other side of the Missaquash, their buildings being burned behind them.

Fort Beauséjour has been made a national park, the ruins have been built up and there is a fine museum in connection containing many historic relics and documents. Many visitors pass through the museum each season along with students of history and romantic lore.

History was made at Fort Beauséjour, the siege for which was not bloody, in fact it has been termed "The Velvet Siege of Beauséjour," yet it was one of those things on which greater events pivoted and from Beauséjour commenced the conquest of Canada by the British. Today trains of the Canadian National Railway pass within view of Fort Beauséjour and its bastions have witnessed those trains freighted during two world wars with dependents of these early pioneers, both French and English, travelling to sea-board to embark on transports at Halifax for overseas, there to fight on the battlefields of Europe for the integrity of the country they once both fought each other to possess.

COLOR VISION

Sufferers from color blindness will be glad to learn from authorities that, in many cases, what they have thought of as an incurable affliction may, in fact, be due merely to deficiency troubles which can be corrected.

In this modern age of speed and multiple machinery, science acknowledges that faulty color vision is a serious handicap, but urges all those afflicted to consult medical authorities, in the hope that something can be done "out it."

Defect in color vision is usually hereditary, and is more common in males than females. Many cases are definitely beyond correction, unfortunately, when it is impossible for a person to distinguish between the primary colors at any time.

ADEQUATE LIGHT

While it may be effective and sufficient for some purposes, indirect lighting in the home is likely to be poor for reading and study periods. Health officers specializing in illumination research declare that semi-direct reading lamps, preferably of the floor type, should supplement the normal lighting of a room for any form of close work.

Where there is likelihood of several members of a family simultaneously reading, sewing or engaging in occupations requiring attention to detail, floor or table lamps should be available at their favourite chairs or tables. The overhead globes won't give all of them proper illumination where it is most needed.

EXPERTS' TIPS GUIDE STORAGE

A three-point program of care for winter woollens will bring clothes out of summer storage without loss of shape or damage from moths next fall.

First need, say experts, is to make sure woollens are spotlessly clean. The tiniest food spot left on the fabric may be a banquet table for moth grubs and larvae. Other types of stains, if allowed to "set" for months, may be impossible to remove later.

Woollens that won't launder should be freshly dry-cleaned before storing. Launderable garments should be washed in tepid water, mild acids.

Knitted apparel should be lifted from the rinse water, squeezed lightly and rolled immediately in a turkish towel to blot up excess moisture without stretching elastic fibers. Dry away from heat.

Second step is careful pressing. Pin pleats in place, draw button holes together and place dry firm-bodied pressing cloth over wool. Dampen the cloth—not the wool—and press lightly with warm iron. Stop pressing while wool is still slightly damp to avoid putting a shine on the surface of the fabric.

The final step is storing. For that, the driest, coolest spot in the

LONDON GIRLS PEARL EXPERTS

Ethel and Constance Austen are reputed to be England's leading pearl specialists. The sisters came to the BBC microphone the other day to tell listeners about their pearl-stringing business which they have been running in Hatton Garden, London, for the past 15 years. Their father, a well-known jeweller, died when they were in their teens and with the money he left them they bought their business and also qualified as Fellows of the Gemmological Association, where they learned how to identify the different types of stones. They estimate at that about a million pounds worth of jewellery passes through their hands in a year.

"Some of the loveliest jewellery we re-string is that sent in by wealthy Indians," Constance remarked. "I remember one Maharajah would not allow anything but pure gold touching his skin and before I could re-thread his pearls, I had to dip even the threading silk in pure gold." But the Austen sisters appreciate their work for its own sake, whatever its worth. "One of the loveliest things I have ever done," she went on "was to make a necklace and earrings from a set of exquisite plaques and flowers carved out of common bone by one of our lads when he was in a prisoner-of-war camp. He used a rough file and a pocket knife. I think he must have been a born artist, because he had never carved anything in his life before."

house is the safest summer home for all woollens.

Whether your storage space is a chest, bag or box, it should be an airtight fortress against moths. Gummed tape is excellent for sealing paper folds against these invaders. Before enclosing the woollens, spray with moth repellent or sprinkle moist crystals liberally between woolen folds, into pockets of garments and storage container crevices.

Don't jam woollens together in a small space, if you want the resilient fibers to hold their shape. Freshly dry-cleaned clothes can be stored in their cleaner's bags

providing all holes through which moths can enter are sealed. As an added precaution, the practical housewife will check at least twice during the summer for any trace of moths. Respraying and re-sealing woollens is easier and cheaper than replacing garments.
