WIRES STILL OUT.

This stereotyped announcement, which has appeared on the front page of the Guardian for several days past, is becoming monotonous. We have borne with the matter patiently, as our readers have, but there is an end even to patience.

The following letter, which explains itself, has been received by His Honor, Lieutenant Governor Rogers, in connection with the China Famine Fund.

The Hon. Benjamin Rogers, Lieut. Governor, Government House, Charlottetown, P. E. I.

Dear Sir,—I am in receipt of a letter from the Manager of the International Banking Corporation, New York, enclosing the text of a message you wished sent to the Famine Committee in China, which reads:—"Sent forward from contributors this Province with sympathetic good wishes, eighteen hundred sixty-five dollars."

The Famine Committee is very grateful to you for your personal interest in the conditions of those who have suffered so much in China and for the generous subscriptions which you forwarded.

The Committee's work will soon be over, and we hope before long to issue our report, a copy of which will be sent you. In the meantime I take pleasure in forwarding to you reprints from two of our local papers in Shanghai which will tell you something of the work that the Committee has been trying to do.

The Committee has, in addition, tried by the work which it has carried on to convince the Government of the advisability of using famine relief money in employing the people in doing useful works.

Allow me on behalf of the Chinese members of this Committee to express to you their sincere thanks for what you and your people have done for them.
