ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST

The Princess arrived last night at 8.15 and the express at 9.30.

Up till a late hour last night no trace had been found of Willie Loneragan the little boy who was lost Wednesday evening.

THE Charlottetown Condensed Milk Company shipped 900 cases condensed milk by the Campana on her last trip from this port to Montreal and the Pacific Coast.

THE football game between St. Dunstan's and the Victorias which was to have taken place yesterday war, by mutual consent postponed, owing to the unfavorable weather.

Rev. A. MacLean Sinclair will preach in St. Andrew's church, Orwell next Sabbath at three o'clock. There will be no service in Orwell head church on Sabbath morning but the prayer meeting will be held at the usual hour in the evening.

THE fire bell rang at twenty minutes to seven last night for a blaze in a barn near the corner of Queen and Euston Streets owned by John Dalziel. The fire was started from a lantern which exploded setting the hay ablaze. When the firemen arrived the roof was in flames but in a few minutes the fire was under control and soon extinguished.

THE mysterious disappearance of Willie Loneragan son of James Loneragan of the Commercial Cafe was reported yesterday. He was last seen about three o'clock Wednesday afternoon when he returned from school and went down to the Steam Navigation Wharf with several boys. Later they went to another wharf and left him throwing sticks and stones in the water. No trace has since been found of him and it is supposed that he is drowned.

THE adjourned case of Peter Scott against Daniel McCallum for stealing \$140 in Josey's bar room last September occupied the attention of the Magistrate at the Police Court all day yesterday. A number of witnesses were examined and after addresses by P. J. Trainor for the prosecutor, and A. J. B. Mellish for the prisoner, McCallum was sent up to the Supreme Court to stand trial in January.

Lou W. Wright formerly of the New York fish firm of Wright and Meigs and a native of Middleton P. E. I., is now engaged in conducting a large poultry farm on the Erie Road at Walker Valley about 110 miles from New York. Mr Wright has immense buildings on the farm which are filled with incubators and brooders. This season over 2000 pairs of chickens have been shipped. Mr. Wright is doing a big business as may be estimated from the fact that these chickens are sold when weighing from two to three pounds at the rate of 72c apound.

Next week, when repairs are completed, she will resume her usual trips between Sydney and Newfoundland.—Halifax Herald.

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LAST NIGHT'S CONCERT A GREAT SUCCESS.

The Caledonian Club of Charlottetown are to be congratulated on the success attending their concert in the Opera House last evening. The audience which in spite of the terrible weather filled the Opera House, was simply delighted with the program offered, and it is safe to say there has been a more popularly successful Scottish concert given in this city. The same has probably occurred in other places on the I. P. E. The phenomenal violinist MacKenzie Murdoch made the success of the evening. And what a success that was. Never have we heard such a clever manipulation of the king of instruments. Murdoch seems to possess all the essential qualifications of the great artist, temperament, artistic interpretation, technique, are all his to a remarkable degree, and although with the brilliant runs and difficult execution he surprised his hearers, he was equally if not still more effective in quiet soul stirring melody, in which he gave evidence of his God given gifts, which are more rare than those coming from much application and study.

The enthusiasm which Murdoch's playing called forth has probably never been exceeded in the Opera House. Mr. Neil the tenor also delighted the audience. He was encored time and again responding graciously. Neil possesses a splendid lyric tenor, and uses it most effectively in the Scotch songs. Mrs. Craig's sweet singing won her many friends, as did the refined and clever comedy which was Harry Munro's contribution to the program. We regret that the early hour at which this paper goes to press, makes it impossible to give the extended reference to the entertainment and artists, which the merit of the occasion deserves. Had the weather continued fine the capacity of the Opera House would have been entirely made inadequate to have accommodated the large number who were prevented from attending. The committee in charge of the concert, Jas. Eaton, David Small, and Colonel Stewart deserve the thanks of the community for their efforts in connection with last night's delightful entertainment.
