

Beavers Overcome Home Ice Jinx To Defeat Moncton Hawks 5-2

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Dec. 6 — (CP) — Saint John Beavers finally overcame their at home jinx with Moncton Hawks by trimming the birds 5-2 tonight for the first win in five home games against Moncton. Beavers and Dartmouth Arrows remained in a second place the five points below Hawks as the latter's lead narrowed in the Maritime Senior Hockey League schedule.

The teams divided a pair of goals in both the first and last periods but Beavers sewed up the game with three in the middle session.

Centre Dick Wray scored one and picked up three other scoring points while Nick Nicolle, with two assists, advanced to second place among the league's leading scorers.

Mike Demchuk shot a brace for Saint John Joe Szabo and Ralph Croucher also tallied. Moncton scorers were Paul Gagnon and Carl Bastarache.

Beavers used a new forward, Cecil Dowling of Charlottetown.

Gagnon opened the scoring with little trouble after a breakaway early in the first period. Gordon Leckie passed to Buck Whitlock, who relayed the rubber to Gagnon. Shortly before the session ended Beavers equalized with a gangling attack. Goalie Al Tomori fell to see the puck lay beside him and Szabo shoved it into the cage. Assists were credited to Wray and Frank Grabowski.

Outplaying the invaders, Beavers shot three without a reply during the second frame. Demchuk, Nicolle and Wray combined for the first two, with Mike doing the shooting. His first goal was a gift, deflecting from a Moncton player's skate, but the second was well earned. Croucher, assisted by Bobby Newton, made it 4-1 while Ray Leger served time Szabo.

Moncton's second and last goal of the night was scored by Bastarache as he and Gagnon rode in on Sonny MacDonald. Then Wray, unassisted, gave Beavers a wider margin although three players were between him and the goal mouth.

3-Day Hockey School Opens In City Tonight

With the arrival of Frank "King" Clancy on the late plane this afternoon, the three-day school for coaches and referees will get underway tonight at the Charlottetown Hotel at nine o'clock.

Clancy, one of the N.H.L.'s all time greats as a defenceman, and at present one of the leading referees in N.H.L. circles, will be the chief instructor during the school here which is being sponsored by the Department of Physical Education under the direction of Brigadier W. W. Field.

Pete Kelly, who needs no introduction to local sports fans, is already in the city and will be the other leading instructor at the school. Kelly is at present holding the post of director of physical education at the University of New Brunswick.

The opening feature of the school tonight will be a talk on hockey rules and refereeing by Mr. Clancy. An open question period will follow.

Representatives who will attend the school as far as can be learned at the present time include one from Tignish, O'Leary four, Sum-

merside eight, Charlottetown six, Kensington two, Montague two, Murray Harbor two, Crapaud two, Victoria one, Souris two and North Westport one.

In addition to those attending from the Province, there will be seven representatives from the Mainland, including two from Sydney, one from Halifax, one from Springhill, two from Amherst and one from Moncton, making a total of some 38 students in all.

The program for Wednesday will include morning, afternoon and evening sessions, which will take in lectures and practical demonstrations at the Forum, on many phases of hockey. A banquet at the Charlottetown to conclude the day's activities, Thursday will be another full day of lectures and demonstrations. The school will be concluded early that night and will be followed by an Exhibition hockey match between the Amherst Ramblers and the Charlottetown Abegweit senior squad, with King Clancy officiating as referee, and six candidates of the school acting as linesmen.

Storm Of Protest Over Woodcock's Win From Lee Savold On Foul

(By Bill Macklin) LONDON, Dec. 6 — (AP) — Bruce Woodcock, British heavyweight champion, beat Lee Savold of Paterson, N. J., on a fourth-round foul tonight but the verdict caused an immediate storm of protest.

Dropped in the third round for the count of eight, the Englishman rolled to the canvas again suddenly in the fourth after being struck by a right-hand blow.

He clutched his groin, writhing and grimacing, while Savold stood by, frowning in bewilderment.

Referee Sam Russell stepped in quickly and ruled that Savold had struck a low blow. The American was disqualified.

Rafter-rocking boos poured from the crowd of 11,000 who had assembled in Harringway Arena to watch the 10-round bout which was supposed to produce a summer challenger for champion Joe Louis.

"It wasn't a low punch," Savold complained afterwards. "It landed on the solar plexus. In any case, it was just a light tap."

Savold's manager, Bill Daly, called Woodcock a "faker" and added: "He knew Lee had him going and that was the only way he could win the fight."

Most of the British boxing writers at the ringside said the blow, if low, was a "light one."

Woodcock, his face still screwed up in pain in his dressing room, said he was "confident all the way through" and he would have won had the fight gone all the way.

Zaduk Loses To French Fighter

MONTREAL, Dec. 6 — (CP) — Laurent Dauthuille of France made an impressive North American debut in the fourth round of the Guepich bout over an unanimous 10-round decision over Pete Zaduk of Guelph, Ont., in the co-feature of a boxing card that drew 7,000 fans to the Forum tonight. The Frenchman scaled 158, Zaduk 154.

In the other main event, Gaby Ferland, Montreal fancy-dan, scored an easy 10-round decision over Joe Pyle of New Waterford, N.S., and thus enhanced his chances of getting another shot at Johnny Greco's Canadian welterweight crown. Both battlers tipped the scales at 147.

Dauthuille, a well-built protégé of Jack Dempsey's, had the youthful Zaduk on the deck once in the fourth round. The Guepich boy took a right hand sock flush on the chin while moving in and dropped for the automatic eight count. He didn't appear to be hurt too much, and weathered this storm to keep out of trouble for the rest of the bout.

The Frenchman connected more often and landed the harder blows to pile up the points. He made a determined bid for a knockout in the 10th heat, but Zaduk played it cagey while getting in a few good belts of his own.

In the co-feature, Ferland, French-Canadian idol of Montreal's east-end, gave the hard-hitting Pyle a masterful boxing lesson in hanging up a well-deserved verdict.

The Nova Scotia Negro, with an impressive K.O. record and two victories over Vancouver's Phil Palmer in the last year, couldn't land his Sunday punch at any stage. Ferland's left jab and left hooks kept Pyle off balance all the way.

Ferland staggered Pyle in the fifth with a flurry of lefts and rights to the head, but the New Waterford boy back-pedalled out of trouble.
