At midnight Thursday night the store and warehouse of Mr. J. F. Norton, Cardigan, with all their contents, were burned to the ground. The fire started from the furnace in the cellar. When discovered, it had made such headway that the buildings were wrapped in flames, rendering near approach impossible. The building was valued at \$3,000, stock at \$9000. Insurance on the whole \$7,000. The books were in the safe at the time. The warehouse contained 4,000 bushels of oats.

EVERY nook and corner of the Salvation Army Hall was filled last evening to hear the story of "The Man Who Spoiled the Music." It was not a concert in any ordinary sense of the word. Nothing under the auspices of the Army is ever done to amuse or pass a pleasant time merely, but rather to press home truths. The story told was of an English carpenter, who brought himself to poverty and the verge of despair by drink, "spoiling the music," as it was expressed. Prof. Hawley is a good manager, and any future presentation under the same auspices will command the practical recognition of the public.

A GOOD audience were present in St. Peter's schoolroom last evening to hear Chaplain Cox, lecture on the Missionary Outlook in South Africa. Mr. Cox began by paying a high tribute to the chaplains sent out by the British Army. The Boers were described as ignorant, cruel, immoral, bitter, with as many other such adjectives as you wish to add; thoroughly hating any person or anything British. They believe the negro has no soul and believing this they do nothing to elevate or educate him either mentally or spiritually but spend their time driving and oppressing that despised race and smoking their pipes. The majority of the Boers belong to the Dutch Reformed church which is closely allied to the Presbyterian. Some of their churches are very fine buildings, Kruger's church in particular being much grander than any church building in this Province. The lecturer told of a service he attended at Bloombfontein among the natives, and nowhere has he ever seen more earnestness and spirituality than was there displayed. He also described a Kaffir wedding which lacked nothing in the way of gorgeous dress, bridal veil, orange blossoms, bridesmaids etc, and for which they must have been preparing for years judging by the speed with which they reverted to their former habitual dishabille. A collection for missionary work was taken and the meeting closed with the National Anthem.

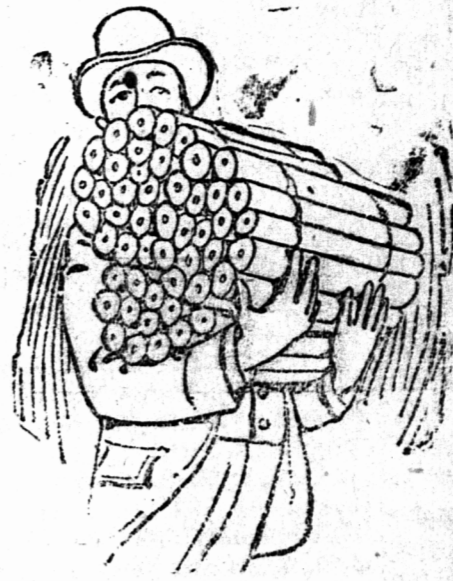
