Golden Bears Hold Drill In Rose Bowl

PASADENA, Calif., Dec. 29—California's Golden Bears held their first drill in the Rose Bowl today, and paid marked attention to the location and direction of the drill.

Veteran Mariner Mourns Passing Of Square-riggers

HALIFAX, Dec. 28—Captain Henry Burke, 71 year old master mariner, has left the call of the sea again.

One of the few remaining master mariners in Nova Scotia, the Lunenburg sea captain who sailed out of his native port for the first time 33 years ago, will be aboard the four-masted Newfoundland schooner R. R. Govin when she takes a cargo aboard at Halifax early in January for Great Britain.

Hate and hearty, the Nova Scotian is looking forward keenly to the voyage across the Atlantic. The thought of sailing again brings back memories and the veteran mariner mourns the passing of the square-riggers, with their sky-sails and studding sails, from Atlantic shipping lanes.

The Lunenburg captain said the "day of making safters is past" because of the floating machinery, square yards to be braced in sharp sail by the wind and checked in when sailing with a fair wind; can be maneuvered without the knowledge of lashing and clubhauling a ship.

Captain Burke has made 150 voyages to the West Indies in sailing vessels from his native province and commanded the brig *Scripture* for 12 years. Her record of sailing from Lunenburg to Puerto Rico, to Turks Island, and back home in 26 days has never been equalled by any other sailing vessel.

Today the docks along the Lunenburg waterfront are occupied by trim-looking schooners whose perfect lines place them second to none vessels of the type of the veteran Bluebonnet, champion of the North Atlantic fishing fleet, but Captain Burke regrets "steam competition has driven the stately old square-riggers off the ocean."

NEW YORK, Dec. 29—Flash, splash and boom! A champion of champions left fighting and yelling in 1937, nipped at the wire for both win and place.

That was Dizzy Dean losing his headline grabbing championship. Replacing him as the fanciest snatcher of screaming banner lines was the United States tennis wizard of the year.

Second with enough headlines to fill 50 mammoth scrapbooks came Joe Louis, whose trials, tribulations and triumphs provided considerable newspaper fodder. And third came Otis Dize. Dean's head was bloody but unbowed. Until he figured he had a sore arm in July he looked sure of winning.

However there's this to be said for Otis Dize. His escapades and poppings-off won the chuckling championship by a long mile. When Dean captured Ford Frick's National League fortress and refused to lower his horns, he filled at least 100 reprintorial notebooks.

Ranking the rest of the headline passers of sport is a ticklish business but fourth place must have been won by Joe DiMaggio, sophomore home run hero of the world champion New York Yankees. Giuseppe changed over season from a quiet, bashful bambino to a slick, well dressed and talkative guy who more than backed up his big talk with noble actions.

Eight round trips over the Atlantic Ocean in search of a fight have fifth place to Max Schmeling. He only succeeded in fighting once and that one was against a second rater. His "phantom fight" with James J. Braddock was a wow.

Suspension Of Q.A.H.A. Confirmed

TORONTO, Dec. 29—The executive committee of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association has confirmed the action of a sub-committee which recently suspended the Quebec Amateur Hockey Association, Fred Marples, secretary of the C.A.H.A., announced in a statement issued here tonight.

The Q.A.H.A. was suspended, the statement said, "because of its action in delaying the ruling of the registration committee" which had declared Don Wilson of the Verdun Maple Leafs and S. Allan of the Montreal Royals ineligible to play hockey in Montreal. The players were said to have failed to comply with the C.A.H.A.'s transfer-and-residence rules.

On and after next Jan. 15 clubs or players competing in a game in which either Wilson or Allan participate will be suspended, it was announced. "For the time being," the statement added, administration of hockey in Quebec will be under the direct control of the C.A.H.A.

OTTAWA, Dec. 29—Judge H. O. McInerney of New Brunswick has been appointed chairman of the Conciliation Board dealing with the dispute of the Minto coal miners, Labor Minister Norman Rogers announced tonight. Judge McInerney was the recommendation of the two Board members already appointed—James Whitebone, Saint John, president of the New Brunswick Federation of Labor, and Harold B. Colwell, Fredericton.

Budge Whips Crawford To Redeem Self

SYDNEY, Australia, Dec. 29—Don Budge, Wimbledon tennis champion, redeemed himself today before 12,000 cheering fans by soundly whipping Jack Crawford of Australia, 7-5, 6-1, 6-1, in an exhibition match.

The crowd's bitterness of Monday over Budge's lackadaisical play with Germany's Baron Gottfried Von Cramm changed as the red-headed Californian flashed many ace past the bewildered Australian.

Adrian Quist of Australia trounced Heinrich Henkel of Germany, 6-2, 6-4, 6-2, and Von Cramm defeated John Bromwich of Australia, 6-2, 7-5, 10-8.

Over Five Millions In Duty Free Goods

OTTAWA, Dec. 29—In the first eight months of the current fiscal year returning Canadian tourists brought in \$5,574,055 worth of goods under the statutory provisions which exempt duty payment up to \$100 in value. The greater part of these goods came from the United States, the total being \$4,836,563, according to National Revenue Department figures released today.

The items are classed "travelers' baggage" and are classified under seven categories, including one for miscellaneous commodities. Chief item was clothing which had a value of \$2,668,514 from all countries, of which \$2,319,415 was from the United States.
