### Plans Completed For the Jubilee At Summerside

The final detailed plans for the Centennial Jubilee Celebration in Summerside have been practically completed. On Wednesday evening the Athletic Committee met in the Prince County Y. M. C. A. Office to receive complete reports from the different sub-committees and to make necessary arrangements regarding courses for events, rules to govern etc. Athletes who have been looking forward to the completion of this work before getting down to final period of training, will be glad to have a brief outline of this information made available.

Mr. Simpson, chairman of the committee reported that quite a number of entries had been received for every event. After careful consideration, it was decided that owing to the lateness of the planting season which made it difficult to get teams together, etc., the date for closing entries should be advanced to midnight, June 25. All inquiries for information, requests for blank entry forms and age certificates, are to be addressed to Mr. H. H. Simpson, Y. M. C. A., Summerside.

The Summerside Y. M. C. A. dressing rooms will be available to before, and dressing rooms and shower baths after, the following events—Ten mile bicycle race, June 28th; Five mile running road race, June 29th; Junior and Senior Relay races, July 2nd. For the water sports, arrangements are being made for the procuring of Holman's Boat House as a ladies dressing room, while the Y. M. C. A. Building which is within a block of the water front, will be available as a Gentlemen's Dressing Room with a checking system for clothes.

The list of trophies includes seventeen cups, sixty-six medals and three shields, practically all of which are already on display in Morris & Allen's and Godkin Bros windows.

Great care has been taken in the planning of each item of the program and the time, place, rules governing, and prizes for each event were decided as outlined in the report given below.

To this report has also been added a number of items arranged by the program committee.

Thursday, June 28th, "Farmers' Day"

10:15 A. M. Farmers' Tag-of-War. Elimination Contest—Armsy Square. Team to be comprised of eleven men active farmers. Standard rules to govern. One medal to each member of the winning team. All competing teams must be on grounds by 10:30 A. M.

11:30 A. M. Catching Greases. Pig. Starting from Armsy Square. Open to anybody. Pig must be caught and held with bare hands and no preparation is to be used on hands. Pigs belong to capturer.

1:30 p.m. and 3:30 p.m. Dr. Grisdale, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, Ottawa, will lecture in the Agricultural Hall. Mr. W. A. Brown, Poultry Husbandman, Ottawa is also expected. Mr. Honore Wright, Bedouque, will be chairman and there will be other local speakers in attendance.

3:30 Knitting Competition—Open to farmers' wives and daughters in Britannia Recreation Club. Wool, needles and pattern will be supplied. Rules to be announced on day of event.

6:15 P.M. Ten Mile Bicycle Race open to any make of wheel. Course starting in front of Brace, McKay & Co's. store, up Central St. to Pope Road, thence to St. Eleanors; from thence along Miscouche Road to a turning point a little over two miles west of St. Eleanors or two hundred and seventy-five yards west of road turning left to meet Linkletter Road. The spot is at present marked with a White Rose Gasoline Sign on each side of the road. Thence back to St. Eleanors following shore road and Water St., west, to finish in front of Brace, McKay and Co's. store.

Prizes—1st. Cup presented by Canadian Cycle and Motor Co. 2nd Cup presented by Mr. Ed. Urch. 7:15 p.m. community singing on Dominion Square. Special programs are being arranged at Capitol and Happyland Theatres.

FRIDAY, JUNE 19TH, "AUTO DAY"

During the day there will be auto demonstrations at the various garages.

6:15 p.m. Five Mile running road race. Course—Starting on Central St. at intersection of First and Central Streets, in front of C. J. SATURDAY, JUNE 30TH, "WATER SPORTS DAY"

2:00 p.m. Motor Boat Race, open to boats of five horsepower and under. Courses to be followed twice around what is known as the inside course, distance about five miles. More definite announcement regarding course and rules to be made later. Prizes, two medals.

2:30 p.m. Dory Singles, distance 1/4 mile. Course and rules to be announced on day of event. Prizes, two medals.

2:45 p.m. Tub Race, Boys distance fifty yards. Course will be announced on day of event. A limited number of tubs will be provided. Rules: One contestant to a tub, to paddle with hands. If upset must get in without assistance and without passing the point at which tub was upset—Prizes, two medals.

3:00 p.m. Tub Race, Girls: distance twenty five yards. Course to be announced on day of event. Rules the same as for boys' tub race above. Prizes, two medals.

3:15 p.m. Dory Doubles. Two men to a dory. Distance, 1/2 mile. Course and rules to be announced in day of event. Prizes, two medals each to first and second boats.

3:30 p.m. Swimming Events: course to be announced on day of event.

1. 100 Yards Swimming—Boys. Prizes, two medals.

2. 100 Yards Swimming—Girls. Prizes two medals.

3. Swimming under water for distance. To start from float midway between Holman's and Queen's Wharf. Open. Prizes—two medals.

4. 100 yards Swimming (Junior), age under fourteen years open. Age certificates must accompany entry. Prizes, two medals.

4:00 p.m. Start of Yacht Race. Conditions: Boat not to be more than eighteen feet over all nor carry more than 200 square feet of sail. Distance about —miles Course, what is known as the inside course. Prizes, two cups.

4:15 p.m. Preliminaries to canoe jousting event. Conditions: Two canoes at a time with two men in each canoe one in the stern paddling, the other in the bow with an eight foot pole padded six inches from the end with a blunt surface of at least three inches. A team has lost when one or both contestants are forced into the water whether the canoe is upset or not. Canoes will paddle, one from Holman's and one from Queen's Wharf to engage each other. They must, at no time, spend more than three minutes maneuvering for position without engaging each other, and they must keep within a line drawn from the point of Holman's to the point of Queen's Wharf. Prizes two medals to winning canoe.

4:30 p.m. Diving for plates. Place from a float midway between wharves. Conditions: Five plates to each competitor will be thrown the same distance from float by judge. Competitors to dive in order.
