Two ladies well known in this City passed away last night—one was Mrs. Casey, and the other was Mrs. James Dalling. Both had many friends who will mourn their loss.

The Presbytery of P. E. Island, in connection with the Church of Scotland, will meet at Kinross on Thursday the 21st at 6 p.m. for the ordination and induction of Ewen McDougall, and other business. Rev. D. N. MacPhail will preach. Rev. D. McLean will address the minister and Rev. Jas. McDougall the people. Mrs. Harriett Roberts, widow of Robert Roberts, who for years was bookkeeper with A. Gilmour, died Friday at her home at Woolstock, N. B., on the C. P. R. Mrs. Roberts was eighty-six years of age. She was a native of P. E. Island, a daughter of the late Capt. Charles Carr. Two daughters—Miss Harriett C. and Miss Eva St. Clair Roberts, survive their mother. Death has claimed for his own another well-known citizen of Charlottetown in the person of Aubrey H. Fowle. He was a well known figure on the streets of this City in years gone by, but of late his name has been missed from among the activities of life. He had reached a ripe old age—79 years, but although he had not been well for some time past, the end nevertheless came unexpectedly yesterday. Much sympathy will be felt for the widow and for the two daughters of the deceased—Mrs. Fowle and Mrs. George Robertson of this City, and with other relatives.

George W. McCready former City Engineer and one of the oldest and most widely known residents of this city, is seriously ill at his home on Lutz street. Mr. McCready has enjoyed excellent health during his life, but in March last, suffered an attack of la grippe from which he never fully recovered. On Sunday last Mr. McCready attended service three times, and at the evening service he became suddenly ill and remained in a semi-conscious condition during the night. His condition since appeared more favorable at times, until Thursday he fell into a comatose state and has remained so since.—Moncton Times. Mr. McCready referred to is a brother of J. E. B. McCready, Editor of the Guardian.

Advice from Montreal says that receipts of both butter and cheese show shortage as compared with last year, and that dealers and exporters are very reticent about giving their opinion as to the future both as regards probable production and prices, although they very guardedly assert that prices "should" come down. Locally the supply of these articles is meagre, but the trade looks for good arrivals shortly. There are a few new cheese selling, but nobody has very much stock of either new or old. The expectation that butter and cheese will be cheaper is no doubt largely based on the fact that this is the natural tendency of everything in quiet times. Eggs are firmer than when we last reported, due to smallness of deliveries and a fairly active local demand. In Prince Edward Island buyers are now giving 17c. for new stock.

A well-known resident of Johnston's River, met death by accident on Saturday.—James Dunphy, a prominent farmer of that section, who was 74 years old. He with his son-in-law was engaged in building a load of hay, Mr. Dunphy being on top of the load. After sufficient hay had been piled on the load, the two men proceeded to secure the load to the cart, in the usual way—by means of a longer across the top from front to back of the load. While binding the longer to the cart, it broke, and the end, which Mr. Dunphy was pressing down at the time snapped off in his hands, causing him to fall headlong to the ground. When he struck the shock broke his neck and death was practically immediate. The suddenness of the affair has aroused general sympathy. Deceased was born in Johnston's River and was a son of the late John Dunphy of that place, who died some twenty-five years ago. There survive him a widow, three sons, Nicholas, James and John, and five daughters, Mrs. William Trainor, Johnston's River, Mrs. George Simpson, Tarantum Louise and Edith in Boston and Minnie at home.

Mrs. John Crockett, of Middleton, Prince Edward Island, accompanied by her little daughter, Vera, is visiting in Moncton, the guest of Henry and Mrs. Crue. Rev. W. H. Warren formerly pastor of the Baptist Church, North River, and at present lecturer and agent for the Grand Division of Nova Scotia, is at present addressing temperance meetings through Cape Breton. The funeral of the late Mrs. Harrison of Charlottetown, took place Sunday morning to St. Thomas, Cemetery, Long Creek. The services at the church and grave were conducted by the lay reader Chadwick Street. The deceased was a sister of the late Captain Joseph Ball of Duneed. Simmons gave an excellent paper on "Gladstone" last evening before the Young Peoples Society of the Baptist Church. Mr. Simmons graphically described the political and religious life of Mr. Gladstone and the paper was replete with information along these lines. A vote of thanks was moved by J. P. Gordon and seconded by J. E. Welsh. The motion was supported by J. K. Ross, A. F. Webster and Rev. J. R. White.

The work of distributing trout fry from Southport hatchery has been completed. 50,000 grey trout secured in Ontario have been placed in Lake Verde and Thompson's mill pond. The distribution of salmon fry has commenced and will be concluded in about ten days. Murray River and Dunk River, have received their share. Other places yet to receive them are: Mordue, Winter, Wheatley West and Sordine Rivers, and Naufrage Pond. The total number to be distributed will be 950,000, considerably more than last year. The lobster hatchery began work Friday.

The distinctive feature of the British and Foreign Bible Society work is that it is a Bible producing as well as a Bible distributing organization. In Canada the Bible is being circulated in seventy-five languages and last year about 180,000 copies were circulated by the Society. At the ports of entry immigrants are met by agents of the Society and are given copies of the Bible printed in double columns. In one of those is the sacred word in the language of the recipients and opposite is found the same word in the English tongue, the moral uplift of this growing The work thus being done tends to Canada. It was felt by all who participated in the conference that the work of the Society merited and should receive heartier support from the Christian communities than it had in the past. Methods of increasing the givings from Charlottetown were discussed and means adopted for making a more systematic and thorough canvass than has been heretofore in the past.
