BRITISH BOWLING TEAM BIDS CANADA FAREWELL

On Eve of Sailing for Home the Bowlers Formally Express Their Thanks.

(Canadian Press.)

TORONTO, Ont., Oct. 14.—The team of lawn bowlers from the British Isles which toured the Provinces of Quebec, Ontario, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta, and British Columbia during two months this past summer sent a letter from the S. S. Montrose on the eve of their departure to the honorary secretary of the Dominion Lawn Bowling Association, expressing pleasure and gratitude in connection with their Canadian trip.

"The British Bowling Team on the eve of departure desires to thank your Association and its constituent members, also the civic authorities, boards of trade and chambers of commerce in the cities and towns we visited, for the generous hospitality and all kinds of assistance which has added another link to the chain of mutual regard.

"Our members are from all parts of the British Isles, and it is through the medium of the press that many beyond bowling circles have travelled great distances to

shake hands and enquire about distant friends and relations, and we feel sure the prominent notice of our visit given in the newspapers has been fully appreciated by the public generally, as well as by ourselves.

"It was found that friendships and regard are formed among bowlers in other occasions were constant and lasting, and in this connection were all fellowmen of Empire citizenship and have extended and amplified the democracy of common interest along with aristocracy of interest in the delightful game which we follow.

"We return home with happy thoughts and dear memories of all we have seen, the games we have played, lost or won, with a strong feeling of having done something in fraternizing, to further purify and foster bowling, which the various associations belonging to it have in mind; the outcome of which, no doubt, will tend to a still greater development of the game in Canada, more particularly by the creation of standard bowling greens with banks and ditches and of regulation size in keeping with the rules and regulations laid down by the authorities on the game. These rules and regulations have been made for the betterment and for a proper understanding, similar to those governing other games, which are recognized the world over.

Calles Announces Rebellion Crushed

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 14.—"This is the end" was President Calles' comment last night on the news of the rebel defeat in Vera Cruz.

The presidency can announce to the country, he added, that the rebellion has been completely crushed and that the Government has succeeded in consolidating the situation without the necessity of resorting to copious bloodshed.

The President issued personal orders that full amnesty be given the officers and men of the rebel forces who surrendered and that they be entrained for mobilization at points to be designated by the government.
