THE CLEAR ISSUES

Those who had the privilege of hearing Sir George E. Foster's magnificent address in the Strand Theatre Saturday evening could not have failed to be struck with and thoroughly convinced of the clearness and practical sanity of the policy of the Meighen government as compared with the wobbling, shifting and evasive policy or want of policy of Mr. MacKenzie King and T. A. Crerar.

In the whole history of Canada nothing as inconsistent and as illogical as the shiftiness these two leaders has ever come before our people and it is only because of the prevailing unrest that either of them has been able to secure even a hearing.

A TAX BOGEY

We understand that an impression is abroad that the present registration of voters will result in a poll tax being levied upon those who register.

AUTOCRACY

Autocracy is a word greatly relished by the leader of the remnant of Liberalism. He never tires of its use by way of accusation of Prime Minister Meighen and his government.

MacKenzie King declares that, notwithstanding the platform of a party, he and his lieutenants in whom he has confidence—he did not mention any names—would frame the tariff policy if they got into office and that the platform would only be a chart for them.

What a screaming farce it all is. A convention is held with chosen delegates representing Liberalism from the Atlantic to the Pacific at which the principles and platform of the party are laid down in black and white for all Canadian people backed by the solemn declaration that the platform would be implemented by legislation when the party came into office.

HARD TIMES!

In the course of his speech at Summerside last Thursday evening, Sir George E. Foster said: "If we Canadians had just one glimpse of the conditions of things in Europe, in every country that took part in the war and compared our present position with their's, we would get down on our knees every hour of the day and thank God that it is as well with us as it is as compared with the sufferings of others."

The remark was timely and appropriate. We in Canada and even in Prince Edward Island have been complaining of hard times. We forget that only a few years ago we were prepared to give all that we had and were to save our country. We saved it. We gave not only what we had but what we were to effect this salvation; we gave 60,000 of our sons, the flower of our people and we turned our industries and our business upside down and did not begrudge it.

Worse, much worse, than this characteristic of perfidy, is their absolute lack of common decency, honesty of purpose, or ordinary public principle. They are out after votes, IF THEY CAN GET THEM, and there is no act too small, no expedient too vile for them to act upon.

Canada today is a paradise of comfort and prosperity in comparison with any one of the other nations that took part in the war. We have our burdens, it is true, we have our little war debt, our unemployment, our comparatively costly living, but we have our country and its unlimited resources; we have wealth more than sufficient to cover our necessities.

BE SURE AND REGISTER

VOTERS: be sure and register. Every Liberal-Conservative voter, man and woman should register his or her name with the Registrar for the Polling Division in which voter lives.

EACH VOTER must appear personally before the registrar and get his or her name on the list. In case of sickness or absence from the city a relative or employer of the voter can register the vote of the person sick or absent.

REGISTRATION will begin on MONDAY, OCT. 31 and continue until SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 5. The registrars will be in their respective places every day from 9 a. m. until 9 p. m. except between 1 and 2 and between 6 and 7. There are 4 registrars for the whole city.
