Germans Advance In Kiev Drive

Soviet army appears closing in on Smolensk on central front.

MOSCOW, Sept. 15—(Monday)—(AP)—The Russians acknowledged today a retreat by Red army forces from Kremenchug, on the east bank of the Dnieper River, before German units lengthening the southern jaw of a giant pincer movement against Kiev.

Kremenchug is a rail junction 175 miles southeast of Kiev and 85 miles northwest of Dnieperopetrovsk, already abandoned hydro-electric power and industrial centre on the Dnieper.

The abandonment of this town followed by four days the announcement last Friday that Russian forces had withdrawn from Chernigov, 80 miles north of Kiev between the Dnieper and Desna rivers.

In extending the northern jaw of their pincers aimed at Kiev, the Germans drove southeastward to increase this threat to the Ukrainian capital.

With these two fiercely fought operations the Germans apparently are trying to form a junction behind Kiev to form the distant right and left flanks of the city which long has held firmly against the fierce German offensive.

ANKARA, Sept. 14—(AP)—Unofficial reports said tonight that Germany has ordered a standstill of all commercial shipping in the Black Sea ports of Rumania and Bulgaria.

Zagreb 'phone System blasted; Bombs used

ZAGREB, Croatia, (Via Berlin, Sept. 14)—(AP)—Four time bombs exploded in Zagreb's central telephone exchange today, injuring a German major and at least 13 other persons, while in another part of the city six Croat soldiers were wounded by machine-gun fire.

German Major And 13 Other Persons Injured.

The first bomb in the telephone office, located in the main post-office building, exploded at 12:30 p. m. Three other blasts occurred 20 minutes later.

The explosions crippled Zagreb's telephone system and made calls within the city or to outside points impossible. There was no indication when communications again were restored.
