Potato Re-Inspection

It is hoped that some attention will be paid at Ottawa to the protest of our potato shippers with regard to the regrading of cars of potatoes at destination which have passed satisfactory inspection at points of shipment.

It is not surprising that they are protesting against a situation which, they suspect, may be due to laxity in the inspection service. They express confidence in the qualifications of the inspectors appointed in this Province.

Island shippers are not the only ones who have suffered in this respect. At the last annual meeting of the Horticultural Association at Ottawa this matter was taken up by representatives of the New Brunswick government on behalf of the shippers of that Province.

A Cabinet Split?

Interesting if true is the statement by the London correspondent of the Financial Post that the Canadian delegation at the Imperial Conference was split on the question of conceding to the terms of the proposed Anglo-American trade agreement.

Examination of the précis of the proposed Anglo-American agreement, says the Post's correspondent, revealed to the Canadian delegation the extent of the United States demands for a share of the United Kingdom market, now so largely reserved to Dominions' products under the Ottawa agreements.

One of the major requests made by Washington was for equality of treatment in the United Kingdom market for American lumber and fruit. In other words, Washington has asked not that it be given merely a restriction of the preferential entry now enjoyed by Canada, but that the preference on these two major commodities be wiped out entirely.

Before the United States and the United Kingdom can enter into any arrangements which would disturb the existing status of Canadian preferences in Great Britain it will be necessary for those two countries to approach Canada. And Canada will insist upon a suitable quid pro quo.

The situation, says the Post writer, is one fraught with grave difficulties and the negotiations between the United States and the United Kingdom and the ancillary negotiations with Canada must inevitably be prolonged.

Canada is lacking in the Post writer's summary of the situation. That is the fact that the British delegates were no more favorably inclined than Mr. Dunning to scrap the advantages of Empire preferences for the benefit of the United States.
