(Special to the Guardian) PARIS, Feb. 6.—It is now possible to indicate, in rough outline at least, what is likely to be the map of new Europe which will be born to the peace conference.

LORD NORTHCLIFFE QUILTS JOURNALISM

Retires From His Various Newspaper Enterprises Owing To Ill-Health.

LONDON, Feb. 6.—Lord Northcliffe has retired as chairman of his associated newspapers, which include the Daily Mail, the Evening News and the Weekly Dispatch, thus ending one of the greatest romances in the history of the world's newspapers.

Lord Northcliffe as Alfred Harmsworth, a young and penniless man, made three vows—to become a millionaire, to be the owner of the Times and to be made a 'belted Earl'.

He retired from the directorship of his papers many months ago, so that his absence now will not interfere with the great developments which are contemplated at Carmelite House, now that the war is practically ended.

League of Nations Officially Agreed To

Heavy Losses Inflicted On the Bolsheviki

Poles and Czechs Form An Armistice

BASEL, Feb. 6.—An armistice between the Polish and Czech-Slovak forces which have been fighting on the Silesian front was signed on February 3rd, according to advices received here.

Pacifists, Defeatists, Bolsheviki and Pro-Germans Investigated the Trouble. The Real Labourers Are Not in It.

South African Market For Canadian Goods

(Special to the Guardian) OTTAWA, Feb. 6.—Union of South Africa representatives now in England have intimated that there exists in those countries a considerable market for Canadian manufactured goods, according to advices received here.

Admiral Jellicoe Will Be In Canada in October

LONDON, Feb. 6.—The Canadian Press learns that Admiral Jellicoe in the course of his naval mission to the Dominion will reach Canada in the latter part of October, remaining there until January.

4,000 R.A.S. Men Refuse Duty in London

LONDON, Feb. 6.—More than four thousand mechanics of the Royal Army Service Corps have refused to go on duty in depots adjoining London. They claim that their contract with the government as soldiers is at end and demand that they be demobilized and engaged as civilians to continue the work or be given the same pay that civilians would earn.

OTTAWA, Feb. 6.—Fred James, Official correspondent with the Canadian Corps writes from Bonn to the Director of Public Information that since the first and second divisions of Canadian troops came into Germany there have been only eleven deaths due to sickness, mostly pneumonia following influenza. The bodies of Canadians who have died in Germany are buried in Bonn in a special plot set apart for Canadians.
