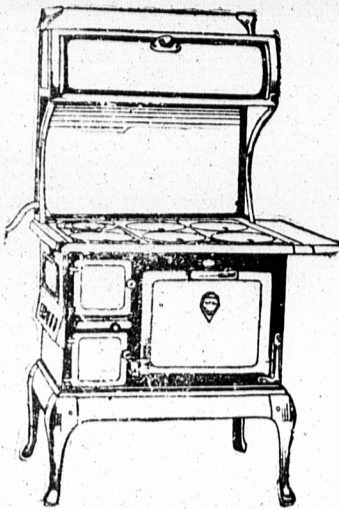


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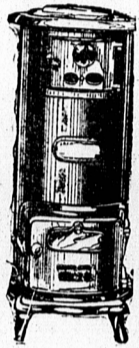
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Eldon School Fair

The Eldon School Fair which comprises the school districts Eldon, Upper and Lower Newton, North and South Pinette, Mt. Buchanan and Point Prim was held in Belfast hall on Wednesday, September 16th. There was a large crowd of parents and visitors present and more school children than on former years and as this is really a children's day it shows up as being a greater success when there is a large crowd of Juniors present.

Inspector W. A. MacPhee was present and conducted everything in his own genial way which pleased the pupils by whom he is greatly admired. The judges present were Mrs. John Beer, Montague, who judged cooking, sewing and flowers and Mr. W. P. MacLeod, East Royalty who judged the farm products, fruit, etc. Mrs. Beer had to leave for the West of the Island after she finished judging and was not able to speak to the pupils on their different exhibits. Her regrets were given by Inspector MacPhee during his remarks.

Competition being very close in many things, it made it rather difficult for the Judges. The table of cut flowers was certainly a thing of beauty and very much admired. The Manual Training exhibits were to the writers mind better than they have been for some time, two gates being something new in Fair exhibits and worthy of honorable mention. Another feature deserving note was a different display of Roots, many kinds in a nicely arranged order on a board showing great patience as well as skill being needed before the result was obtained.

The school work was certainly a credit to the teachers especially as the Inspector in his address at the close said that same excels in the Eldon fair.

The Junior farmers proudly leading their calves to the judges stand showed that the dairy business of the future is not in the wane. As the weather looked threatening the sports were carried on immediately after the inside judging was finished and all the children entered into the different races with great zest, proudly wearing their ribbons afterwards with probable visions of greater Olympic prizes in the future.

The Sports were carried on by Inspector MacPhee and teachers Messrs. Murchison and MacKenzie.

After a few remarks by Mr. MacPhee and Mr. MacLeod there was a splendid exhibition of Physical drill by Miss MacPherson and Miss MacDonald's school and was very interesting to all present. This was something rather new in school fair work here as also oral reading in which young pupils contested. On the whole a very pleasant and profitable afternoon was spent but before another Fair rolls around it would certainly be a great improvement if arrangements could be made to have the table containing the cooking, fudge and fruit so arranged, possibly in a glass case similar to what we see at the Provincial Exhibition, that our late comers could have the benefit of seeing all the splendid exhibits before they are removed.
