Nothing New Re Lindbergh Ransom Money

Miss Anderson has not been approached by the police and first learned of the case when interviewed by newspapermen. She said her only knowledge of the bills was that she had received them from the manager of the bank at Hampton.

The situation has aroused little, if any comment in this village. Miss Anderson visited Moncton today and planned returning tonight.
