"A novel of Brete Harte's," said Mr. Miller.

"Are you quite sure?" asked the poet. "Are you quite sure I am an immortal being?"

"Of course you are."

"If that is so," responded Miller, "I don't see why I need be economical of my time."

The accompanying sketch of the pyre and monument is to serve both purposes—was taken from a California paper some time ago. It is described, as follows:—It has already been built under his own supervision, and from his own designs, in a romantic spot on the top of a heaven-kissed hill back of the poet's home in Oakland, where big trees thrust themselves up into the air and huge boulders dot the ground. Upon one of these is carved in big letters "To the Unknown," the poet's greeting to the future which he cannot pierce. The pyre itself is a square, solidly built of 620 rough blocks of stone. Three steps lead up to it. It is ten feet square and eight feet high, so that from the top-top a man can look over and see in the top only a shallow depression.

Here the poet has directed that his body be cremated, and the ashes scattered to the winds.
