RICH POSSIBILITIES FOR COLT TROTTERS

Mr. J. M. Nicholson in forwarding the following writes: I am enclosing clipping from the Trotter & Pacer of May 17th, showing how a good two year old trotter can win \$10,500 and a three year old trotter \$12,000 over the half mile tracks mentioned. On P. E. I. we have as well bred colts as there are in the world and certainly get a chance to earn a dollar. With the classes for the exhibition races to be made up, it is hoped they will give the colts a chance. In reviewing the advertisements of various race meetings in a zone readily accessible to the Metropolitan district, the thought came to the writer of the generous opportunities offered two and three-year-old trotters over what it used to be in the not so far back era. Following out the idea it further has been found out that for 15 weeks of the week, starting with the week ending Oct. 26 at Avon, Conn., and winding up at Brockton, Mass., in October, that the magnificent total of \$45,800 is to be given to the younger divisions of our campaigning stables, and that it would be possible, if one had a youngster good enough to win every week to place on the right side of the ledger the handsome sums of approximately \$10,500 for a two-year-old and \$12,000 for a three-year-old.

The circuit, if we may so term it, that we have made up, does not by any means include every track within easy reach of New York City, and many other similar circuits could be made up in all sections of the country, but this selection has been made merely for illustrative points.

Following is the list we have in mind, together with the value of the purse hung up for colt trotters, given in chronological order.

In fact, of his entire 10 starts he lost but one race and in that one was a heat winner and placed the tidy sum of \$6,425 and the credit side of the ledger. Had the purses been of the same amount last season as they will be this year, the total would have been higher as at several of the places he placed he raced last season and included in the above list the purses ranged several hundred dollars lower.

HANDS OFF CHINA IS DR. TSUR'S ADVICE

OTTAWA, May 29—Dr. Tsur, consul-general of China at Ottawa this morning deplored the suggestion made by H. G. W. Woodhead, editor of the Pekin and Tientsin Times, and Col. Alexander Reiss head of the exporting firm of Reiss

and Co., Hong Kong, on landing at Vancouver, B. C., that intervention by outside powers was the only solution of the trouble in this country. Dr. Tsur says that such a step would only serve to scatter the trouble all over China instead of keeping it in one particular section, as at present.
