TELEPHONE EXTENSION—The Executive Council at its meeting yesterday decided upon the following extension of the telephone service in the Island—from the head of St. Peter's Bay, on the north side, to Greenwich, a distance of 8 1/2 miles.

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FOR PUBLIC CONVENIENCE—In connection with the extra pressure of business that the Christmas season brings, the Post Office authorities, for the convenience of the public, have arranged for the public wickets at the G.P.O. in the city to remain open an hour longer for business at nights until after Christmas. The wickets will close now at 9 p. m. instead of 8 p. m.

THE PORK MARKET—There has been a big drop in the pork market, both in the price and the quantity offered. So said a prominent pork dealer and shipper when in conversation with a representative of The Guardian, yesterday. At this period last year the price given for pork ranged from 11 1/2 to 11c. per lb., while this year it is only from 10 1/2 to 10c. per lb. This is for pork consigned for the foreign markets. The dealer could not explain exactly the cause of the large drop, but thought it was due mostly to the fact that western pork was being forced on the eastern markets, and thus decreasing the demand for home pork.

POULTRY—Charlottetown poultry dealers are having a very brisk market for their products abroad and are receiving good prices, in fact the quotations are slightly in advance of those for the same time of the season last year. One prominent dealer who has been in the trade extensively for some years says that large quantities are offering for shipment from this port and the demand for them in the foreign markets is such that they are being shipped as rapidly as possible. The price being paid the local farmers is in the vicinity of 22c. per lb. for turkeys; 15c. per lb. for geese and ducks, and 11 to 15c. per lb. for chickens. Of course, as the dealers say, the price is given according to the quality of the poultry offered.

WEDDING BELLS—A very pretty wedding was solemnised at the home of W. R. and Mrs. Taylor, Granville, on Wednesday evening, Dec. 17th, inst., when their daughter, Miss Clara Blanche, was united in the holy bonds of matrimony with Mr. William Warren Pound of Fredericton. The ceremony was performed by Rev. John B. Gough in the presence of a large number of friends and relatives. The bride, charmingly attired in white satin gown, leaning on her father's arm, to the strains of the wedding march played by Miss Melvina Yeo.
