IN MEMORIAM

MR. GEORGE B. MACEACHERN
Many hearts were saddened when
the word was spread abroad on Sat-
urday, March 28th, of the sudden
death of Mr. George B. Maceachern.
Millville, at the early age of 89 years
after a few hours illness. Mr. Mac-
eachern up to the time of his demise
had been in his usual good health
and on Friday afternoon left his
home with a load of wood for a
friend in Mt. Mellick and after un-
loading the wood and leaving for
home, he felt rather weak, but be-
fore arriving at the house he fell
off the sleigh and was carried into
the house by some neighbors. The
doctor was immediately summoned
and all that medical skill could do was
done, but he passed away in the
early hours of Saturday morning. He
was born at Millville, where he spent
the short sojourn of his life. He was
both a farmer and blacksmith. He
was an excellent workman, a master-
hand with the hammer, whether in
the interests of the farmer or fish-
ermen it mattered not. Through the
short years of his life, he won the
admiration of all by his charitable
deeds which will never be forgotten.
His sound judgment and practical
kindness. He will be sorely missed
in the social capacities he so ad-
equately filled as well as in the home,
where he was beloved as a kind hus-
band and father and also in the work
shop where his many patrons joined
with him in pleasant conversation.
Just why one so young should be tak-
en, is hard to understand.
He contemplated his approaching
change without dismay and with
calmness of hope at that eventful
crisis of his existence he resigned his
spirit into the hands of his Maker.
The funeral service which was held
from his late residence at Birch Hill
Cemetery, on Monday afternoon was
very largely attended. Rev. Mr. Dou-
gall officiated. The hymns sang were:

"Make Haste, oh man to Live for

PARIS, April 22 - The smallest el-
ectric train in the world, measuring
only six inches in length, has just
left Paris for London, where it will
be shown among a Model Railway

eight volts, and was made by an Am-
erican. It is a perfect model of a
Pennsylvania electric railway train,
with seats, cushions, windows and
even handles beautifully fashioned.

PARALYSIS REMEDY FOUND
PARIS, April 22 - Through the gen-
erosity of Baron Henri de Rothschild
a group of French physicians believe
that they have discovered a remedy
for general paralysis. The treatment
consist of an injection of a fever
germ which fights the still-unsolved
paralysis germ. The treatment has
just been tried out for the first time
here at the Maradet Hospital, in the
presence of Baron Philippe de Rothschild
and prominent physicians.

KANSAS JACKRABBITS DE-
CREASE
NORWAY, Kan., April 22 - Long-
eared jackrabbits, one of the things
for which the Sunflower state is best
known, are becoming so rare in this
section that they are seldom seen.
Only last season they were so num-
erous as to be destructive to fruit
trees. The rapid decrease is attrib-
uted to the many drives against wolves
during the winter. Hundreds of rab-
bits were slain in each.

TOWN IS DYNAMITE CENTRE
EIKHART, Kan., April 22 - Eikhart
is the dynamite centre of southwest-
ern Kansas because of its unique ad-
vantage of explosive within the city
limits. Nearby towns forbid the un-
loading of dynamite, but this city has
no such ban and consequently is the
basis of operation within a large ra-
dius. Shipping contracts require that
the transportation company remove
the product to a safe distance and
explode it if customers fail to claim
it within 48 hours.

129 DEAD IN STREETS
LONDON, April 22 - A total of 129
persons, 85 of whom were men, 30
women and 14 children, were found
dead in the city streets here during
January and February.

On motion of Dr. MacMillan the House resumed committee reading of an Act to consolidate and amend the several acts incorporating the City of Charlottetown with Mr. MacLean in the chair.
At 1 p. m. the House took recess until 3 o'clock.
At 4 p. m. the House resumed committee Mr. McLean in the chair. The statute regarding the appointment of a civic tax appeal board was discussed. Hon. Mr. LePage said the citizens are not satisfied with the present appeal board. He thought this statute should be held over until a better arrangement was made.
Hon. Mr. Stewart asked if the hon. member had any concrete suggestion.
Hon. Mr. LePage said he would rather leave that to the City Council.
Hon. Mr. Stewart pointed out that the legislation had only been introduced two years ago. Two of the men who have sat on the Tribunal are not officials of the city in any sense.
Hon. Mr. LePage asked if there was an appeal from the decision of the tribunal.
It was pointed out by Mr. Allen that there was such an appeal to the Supreme Court.
Hon. Mr. Stewart believed that the civic tribunal as constituted should be more satisfactory in trying tax appeals than the County Court.
Premier LePage said he could not understand the objection if the members of the Tribunal were not now civic officials. The section carried.
Hon. Mr. LePage suggested that there should be some regulations respecting airplanes flying sufficiently low as to annoy or inconvenience citizens.
Hon. Mr. Stewart said this question with regard to jurisdiction in the matter of airways was now before the Supreme Court of Canada.
Mr. Allen thought there should not be undue delay in publishing the Civic Accounts. The accounts should at least be published in advance of an election.
The borrowing power of the city was discussed by Hon. Mr. LePage, Hon. Mr. Stewart, Premier LePage and Mr. Allen.
At 6 p. m. progress was reported and the House took recess until 8 o'clock.
