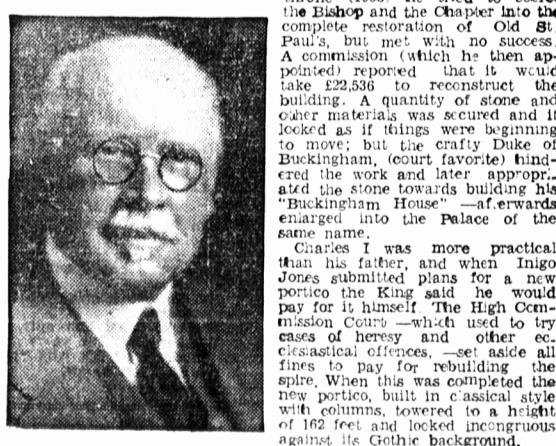
ST. PAUL'S CATHEDRAL
