TORONTO, June 8—(CP)—Olympic athletes seen far in the past these days when bowlers have replaced passports and international competition is everything but polite. But Olympic athletes are remembered as the cream of Canada's sporting crop and one of the best Canadian Olympic athletes in the last two Olympic competitions was the hockey team of the 1932 games—Winnipeg.

Bill Cockerburn was goalkeeper for that team, which won the Allan Cup in 1931 and the Olympics the next year. Now he is FO. Bill Cockerburn, R.C.A.F., stationed at Brandon, Man. He coached a team of men that lost out of Port Arthur Pascois in the Western intermediate hockey playdowns a couple of months ago.

Cage star Norman (Rip) Seely is a quartermaster in the Royal Canadian Navy at his home town of Saint John's. During the past basketball season Seely, a consistently high scorer, was rated No. 1 man of an all-star team at Halifax.

P. R. Risdale writes from Battleford, Sask., that his son, Gerald, is in the Canadian Navy. Before enlistment Gerald was a star in Western Canadian track and field competitions, particularly in pole vault. He picked up 16 points for Battleford Collegiate in the Saskatchewan track and field championship of 1940, specializing in field events.

Lieut. Henry Viney of Leithbridge, Alta., is stationed at Camp Borden, Ont. He was a hockey and hoop referee in southwestern Alberta and was well known as an authoritative sports broadcaster.

Night Baseball Out For Duration In New Jersey

TRENTON, N.J., June 9—(AP)—Leonard Dreyfus, state civilian defense director, announced today a drastic revision of lighting regulations in New Jersey, aimed at the death knell of night baseball for the duration. The order is effective tomorrow.

Joe Gordon connected with a single off Dizzy Trout in the second inning to run in the hitting string to 26 successive games but Buddy Hassett's streak expired after reaching 20 games when he failed to connect safely in four trips to the plate.

Doerr Paces Red Sox
At Boston, Bobby Doerr collected four hits, including a homer and a double, out of four ties when Boston Red Sox regained second place in the American League by drubbing the fast travelling St. Louis Browns 7-4.

And to add to the Sockers' joy, they collected a glut of their nine hits and all of their tallies against Eddien Auker, one of their many troublesome discards. Doerr's perfect performance boosted his batting average to .39 and also accounted for five of the Boston runs, including two he scored himself.

Repaint Recipe: Bill (Winnipeg Tribune) Frayne offers a war-inspired recipe for golf ball repair: "Place the balls in a solution of washing soda till the paint is all removed. Be careful you do not leave in the solution too long as some damage to the rubber may result. Wash the balls in cold soapy water and dry thoroughly. Place a little paint (golf ball enamel) on the palms of the hands and roll the ball around with a circular motion. Give four or five coats, allowing a full day between coats to dry thoroughly.

Who Says Reds are Pushovers?

CINCINNATI, June 9—(AP)—It now appears, under the climbing June sun, that the wake celebrated for the Cincinnati Reds' pitching staff was a bit premature.

Back in those dreary days of April and May a National League rookie could look good to his boss merely by swinging at Cincinnati hurling. And to the tune of breaking windows behind left field fence, one and all sang, "the Reds' ace is cracking after five years.

But, of a sudden, the Reds turn up in third place only two weeks after feasting at the cellar door. Of a sudden they resemble the team that coasted to the 1940 pennant and world championship. Bucky Walters, Paul Derringer, Ray Starr, Johnny Vander Meer, and Joe Beegs are of a sudden, a solid, unflinching pitching staff again. Elmer Riddle is runding into the form that made him the league's best last year.

Only twice in the last 18 games has the opposition scored more than two runs in the last 10 games, and only 15 runs have been marked against the Reds. Ten came in the sweep of the six-game Boston series, and although the Phillies won both their games here, they got only three runs—1-0 and 2-1.

Reds' Streak Halted By Giants

NEW YORK, June 9—(AP)—Cincinnati Reds' drive upwards in the National League was brought to a halt today after they had won six straight games when they bowed to New York Giants 3-1 at Cincinnati.

Both teams got only five hits each but the Giants buried two of their blows with as many walks and an error to score three runs in the first inning and chase Junior Thompson to his showers. Clyde Shoun and Joe Beegs checked Mel Ott's men through the remainder of the game but the Reds could do little with the offerings of Bill Letzman.

At Pittsburgh, Boston Braves dropped their eighth straight game and gave up fifth place in the National League to Pittsburgh Pirates who shelled out 13 hits to take an easy 10-2 decision behind lefty Ken Heintzelman.

Heintzelman gave up nine hits and was never in serious trouble after the Braves staked him to a four-run lead in the first inning. Singles by Bob Elliott and Al Lopez, both with the bases full, accounted for the markers.

Sundra traded To Brownies

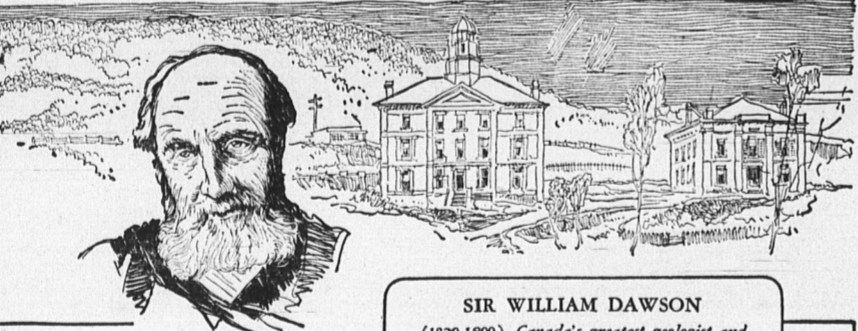
PHILADELPHIA, June 8—(AP)—St. Louis Browns, trying to finish in the first division of the American League for the first time in 18 years, announced Sunday night they had traded outfielder Roy Cullenbine and pitcher Bill Trotter to Washington Senators for outfielder Mike Charlat and pitcher Steve Sundra.

The trade was announced by Donald L. Barnes, president of the Browns, after he had watched his team sweep a doubleheader from the Athletics and keep on the heels of the fourth-place Boston Red Sox. No cash was involved, Barnes said.

Twilight Racing Proving Popular

WINNIPEG, June 9—(CP)—Twilight racing, introduced on Winnipeg tracks this year for the first time, is proving popular.

Despite wartime restrictions prohibiting special tram and taxi services to Whittier Park—a half-mile from the nearest car line—the St. Boniface track has been packing them in. The races are run between 8 and 8:30 each week night, instead of from 2:30 to 5:30 as in other years.
