Who won the hockey game? Well, that's a good question; the Seniors claim a victory; the Juniors do not agree; and the referee ruled in its favor. The official scorer, Mike Dunphy, realizing his precarious position, has refused to produce the official tally sheet.

Sports have highlighted the past two weeks here at St. Dunstan's; there were three hockey games and four basketball games. On Friday, Feb. 27, the Saints advanced to the C.H.L. finals with a 5-4 victory over the Summerside All Stars. The game itself was rather listless, and nearly tragic for the Saints when Joe Mahar was forced to retire with a knee injury at the first period. Fortunately Joe's injury was not serious and he was back for the big game with U.N.B. on the following Tuesday, when the Saints captured the N. B.-P. E.I. intercollegiate championship by defeating U. N. B. 5-1; this victory, coupled with their 5-2 win at Fredericton the previous week gave the Saints a 10-3 margin in the two game series. The game was fast and cleanly played, and the outstanding performance of the U. N. B. goalie kept the score from mounting into the double figures. The Saints now meet the Nova Scotia winners for the Maritime crown. Over there the series are not yet over; it can be St. F. X., Dalhousie, or Acadia. It will be a home-and-home series, commencing probably next week with the final game here in Charlottetown. The first game of the C. H. L. finals on Wednesday night between Saints and Navy ended in a 5-3 tie.

The Saints' basketball team dropped their first game with P.W.C. two weeks ago 28-38, but on Wednesday they defeated Rays Millaires 44-39. Saints are now tied with P.W.C. for second place, and the play-offs are just around the corner. This year the Saints entered intermediate intercollegiate basketball for the first time. They lost the two game series with Mount A. for the N. B.-P.E.I. intermediate title 38-32 and 33-33. The first game was played here Saturday, and the return engagement took place in Sackville on Wednesday night.

On Thursday evening the annual student retreat will commence. It will continue through Friday and Saturday, and will close on Sunday afternoon.

change them. On the contrary, the Conservative party on several occasions, have made their name longer. For example, in 1920 they changed their name to "The National Liberal and Progressive Conservative party of Canada." The Liberal party brought in old age pensions, family allowances and many other social benefits, and that is why I say they should claim the title "progressive."

Free Enterprise "Speaking of socialism, I listened yesterday for a short time to the hon. member for Winnipeg North Centre (Mr. Knowles). I am not finding fault with his speech because I admire him. However, he seems to be opposed to free enterprise. I cannot understand why the C. C. F. party should be opposed to free enterprise because I do not think there would be one of them here today if when he was born his veins had not been full of free enterprise. There was one thing the hon. member for Winnipeg North Centre admitted unwillingly, that is, that the Liberal party would be in power until 1971.

"The Tory member for Queen's (Mr. McLaure) stated that he did not have time to deal with the question of mail couriers and fishermen. If there is any party in this House who should keep away from the mail courier question, it is the Tory party. We all remember the last session before the 1930 election. They brought in an amendment to the Post Office Act to place the mail couriers in the civil service, but the Opposition amendments it was voted down. In the early part of the campaign every mail courier in Canada had in his possession a letter signed by the leader of the Conservative party giving the details of that resolution and saying that if they came to power they would put them all in the civil service. I tell you, sir, it was dangerous to meet a mail courier on the road during that campaign.

"But what happened? Shortly after the Tories came into power the mail couriers began to ask to be placed in the civil service, but instead of placing them in the civil service they threw out all their contracts to tender to keep them quiet. I know that many of these poor men could not get any money. I know one man who was getting \$1,100 and who heard that his neighbour was going to tender for \$500, so he tendered for \$480 and got the contract. But today under a Liberal government that same man is getting \$1,400 under the new regulations brought in last year by the Post Office Department.

"My hon. friend— An hon. Member: "The Tory member for Queen's." Mr. Grant: "Yes, the Tory member for Queen's. He wants to have a share of the glory of those new regulations. When he sees that we are trying to do something he decides to get in on it and take some credit. He claims credit for the 9,393 reefer cars that were brought to the island last year.

Fishery Problems "The affairs of our fishermen are something else that they should keep away from. During their term in office between 1930 and 1935 the fishermen did not do one thing for them. They let them starve. Their boats were rotting at the wharves when we got into power in 1935. When we came into power we instituted the fishermen's loan board and we helped the fishermen to build new boats, and when the war came along they were just beginning to be prosperous again. My hon. friend would try to persuade the fishermen that his party would do a lot for them. We are trying to get the Department of Fisheries to buy canned fish in the Maritimes and send it overseas for relief purposes. If that is done, then my hon. friend will want to take the credit.

"I see the Tory member for Royal (Mr. Brooks) is in his seat. If there is one man in this House who does not like the word "Tory" it is my hon. friend. You cannot mention the word "Tory" without his hair standing on end. I am reminded of the farmer who was working in his fields when a young man came along and put his hand on his shoulder and asked him what he was doing. The farmer said, "I am doing my work." The man said, "I am a farm inspector; stop your work and show me around." He showed the farmer a card which read, "So and so, farm inspector." The farmer looked at the card and said, "I guess that is enough" and he went with him. They looked at all the fields and finally came to a pasture field where there were a lot of cattle. The inspector man jumped over the fence to go to look at the cattle standing in the shade of a canopy which the farmer had erected. When he got near the cattle a male animal came toward him, and the inspector thought he should retreat.

An hon. Member: "More bull." Mr. Grant: "He barely got over the fence before the bull landed. The inspector turned to the farmer and said, "Why do you keep an animal like that around your place?" and the farmer replied, "Why didn't you show him your story which I think the hon. member for Royal should take to heart. The moral is that you cannot reason with a bull."

Mr. Brooks: "There is no reason in your bull." Mr. Fraser: "The moral of that is that a little bull goes a long way."

Mr. Grant: "The advice given me by one of my old teachers is that when you heard nothing, you should say nothing. However, it is hard to resist when the hon. member across the way who I understand is an authority on nails, drives one in. "In some countries there is a bird known as the vulture. It is a stout bird and it watches around for some other bird of its own size to build a nest and lay its eggs and then it goes in and eats the other bird's eggs and lays its own eggs and then it watches around until the other bird hatches out the young ones and rears them. I was just thinking that perhaps these are the tactics that have been adopted by the Tory member for Queen's. Surplus Canned Fish "I notice my time is getting short, and I want to say something to the Government. This Government is not perfect. There are other matters with which the Government should deal. Why not at the same time reduce or abolish some of these taxes that perhaps we can get along without?"
