OWING to the continued gale and snowstorm yesterday morning the S. S. Stanley remained in Pictou and S. S. Minto in Georgetown. It is very likely both boats will try to cross today as the weather probabilities indicate a fine day. There are a large number of passengers now at Georgetown awaiting transportation to the mainland, and freight accumulating at both ports.

THE death occurred at her residence on Fitzroy Street on the 17th inst, of Catherine beloved wife of James A. McDonald and daughter of the late John and Mary Bell of Prince Street, formerly of Morell P. E. I., leaving to mourn a sorrowing husband and six children besides her mother, four surviving brothers and two sisters. The deceased had suffered for five months with true Christian patience and resignation. She was in every sense a true Christian woman, a kind and loving mother, a good obliging neighbor, one whose good deeds will long remain after her, and her death at the comparatively early age of 48 years is much regretted.

YESTERDAY the sad news was flashed over the wires from North Tryon, of the very sudden death of Ellen, beloved wife of John Keough, at the age of sixty-two years. The deceased had been in her usual good health for some time past and able to attend to her home duties. On Wednesday evening she retired to her bed feeling as well as usual and was dead Thursday morning, the cause of her death being heart failure. In her death North Tryon loses one of its most noble women, who had always helped the poor and one whom all looked up to with feelings of great respect. She was a true believer and an honest worker in the Roman Catholic Church and has only passed away from the cares of this world to the better life beyond the grave. Besides a sorrowing husband, she leaves to mourn two daughters, Mrs. James Campbell, Cape Traverse, and Lizzie at home; also four sons, John T., Searleton; Martin, Edward and George at home.

WEDNESDAY'S storm was particularly severe in the Western part of the Island. At Tignish a barn belonging to Captain Frank Gallant, and one belonging to James Christie were unroofed. At St. Louis, Peter Shea's barn was completely destroyed, and the barns of Narcisse Richard, Peter Myers, John Wade, and Jerome Bernard were unroofed. At Alberton, Malcolm McNeill's barn was unroofed, Charles Woodson's windmill blown down, and the smokestack of George Guard's steam mill also was blown down. Father Barke's orchard is probably much damaged, as the snow is from ten to twenty feet in depth. There were several small buildings unroofed in Alberton. At Tignish one of the outside windows of the Patochial house was torn off, the inside window broken and the parlor half filled with snow. At Waterford, Joseph Aylward's barn was unroofed, At Palmer Road Peter McKenzie's barn was blown to pieces. At Peter's River three barns were unroofed owned by Sauton Doucette, Archibald Doucette, and Archibald Gandet. At Pige Brook, James Handrahan's barn was unroofed; at Little Tignish two barns were unroofed; at Mt. Carmel Joseph Richard's barn was blown down. Yesterday morning a crowd of Mr. Richard's friends gathered and brought new lumber and by using the material of the old barn had another erected and all boarded in and ready to begin shingling today. At Egmont Bay Joseph Forrier's barn was blown down. At Summerside a barn owned by J. D. Eoman was blown down.

THE storm which blew into being on Wednesday evening, immediately following the gale of the previous day, raged through the night with a fury that has seldom been equalled in any winter. It appears to have caused more damage in the western part of the Island than elsewhere in the Province. In Charlottetown there is very little damage to record. A chimney was blown down at the Prince Edward Island Hospital, and at the Hillborough Bank also a chimney succumbed to the force of the gale. Shingles were torn from many roofs, and some fences suffered. The storm finally blew itself out at noon yesterday and there was work for snow shovellers to do all over the city. The saddest result of the storm is the regretted death of Oliver Mason of Southport, particulars of which are given on the first page of this issue.
