HENSON EMBARRASSED WHEN INTERVIEWED

SYDNEY, Sept. 21—The following is the interview held by the representative of the press with Matt Hensen, Peary's Lieutenant. "You are Hensen. The negro smiled, "I am." Hensen took the proffered hands rather timidly. By that time he was shifting his feet in much embarrassment. He edged around the side of the hatch and glanced appealingly toward young Borup. "Nothing I can say," pleaded Hensen, helplessly. They besieged him with inquiries. They advanced incontrovertible arguments, beginning and ending with the declaration that he was at the Pole. "I'm sorry," he kept saying. "You'll have to see the commander." But everybody wanted Hensen to tell his own story. "What did he say when he knew he had arrived? Did he get there in fine condition? He answered, "Yes, never felt better." And what did you say? Here, Hensen gave a queer little laugh of half dismay and half confusion. He begged to be excused from saying anything more. He kept pushing gently until he had freed himself from the throng, then he bolted down the companionway to Peary's stateroom. He appeared in a twinkling and there was the sound of a bolt being drawn. It was early afternoon, that two correspondents found him at the dinner table taking with Commander Peary's friend, Mr. Rand. Hensen smiled again, but with less embarrassment. As the visitors passed in front of the table he moved nearer Rand and gave them a quick glance, pushed some bread toward them and asked them if they would have a little coffee. A man of medium size, about 35 or 38 years old, weighing scarcely 145 pounds, quite unassuming, inscrutable, doubtless from nature as much as from choice, who could look evenly at you from behind his glasses and laugh with a subdued sort of embarrassment, undoubtedly a faithful sort of follower, and there you have Matt Hensen, the American born negro who went to the pole with Robert E. Peary. He is not a common, everyday type. Hensen reluctantly confessed that he was with the commander at the pole. He said it in such a low tone that the ear hardly caught the words. "Clear up to the pole and all the time the commander was there?" "Yes," said Hensen a little louder, having found his voice at last, he continued of his own accord. "Have been with him on every expedition except one and that wasn't to the Pole. "What did you do on say when you learned that you were at the Pole?" "Whole thing was just the same. Pole wasn't any different from other parts of up north—way north, I mean. "How did you know you were at the pole?" "I knew it." "Before the commander told you?" Hensen said "You had better see the commander about that."

GERMANY WILL USE DIRIGIBLE BALLOONS

BERLIN, Sept. 21—If present expectations are fulfilled Germany will have dirigible balloons and aeroplanes, carrying passengers between Berlin and the Principal cities of the Empire by May, 1910. The air Navigation Company, which is to perform this service, is being actively financed by institutions, and men of wealth have subscribed to the company's stock. It is not expected to make money from the start, but the hope is entertained that it will be possible to cover expenses from the tourist and other travel. The Company has arranged to buy Zeppelins, Fersevil and Gross dirigible balloons, as well as some of the Wright aeroplanes, if these machines can be adapted to long cross-country trips. Several of the men interested in this new company are shareholders in the company that acquire the Wright patents for Germany.
