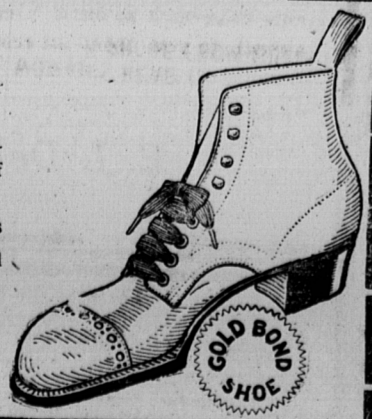

WOMAN'S HEAD IS PROOF FROM BULLETS

WILMINGTON, Del., Jan. 19.—Belle Grant, a young colored woman living at 1127 Orange street, is believed to be the champion hard-headed woman at least in this city. Late last night, in a quarrel with Charles Stevenson, colored, she was shot in the back at the head, but the bullet, although fired at close range, only made a slight scalp wound and dropped to the floor. Belle ran to the street and told Patrolman Elliott that she had been shot, and she showed the policeman the wound. She accused Stevenson, who was arrested for murderous assault.

SPECIAL COFFIN FOR BIGGEST POLICEMAN

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 19.—The biggest and heaviest policeman living in Philadelphia, John Murray Magee, of the Germantown police station, died yesterday from a complication of diseases. He weighed more than 500 pounds and had long been an object of wonder to those who saw the agile manner in which he performed his duties. The undertaker in charge is now building a special coffin for Magee, which will be ribbed with steel. Before Magee's death he had grown so stout that he could hardly force himself through the average doorway. In spite of this he was a fast runner, and had captured many thieves and offenders against the law.

WORKMAN KILLED BY PECULIAR ACCIDENT

BUTLER, Penn., Jan. 19.—While using a crowbar as a lever to start a gas engine at the plant of the A. J. Morris Iron Company at West, Windfield today, A. Tarkin, aged 35 years, was instantly killed. A charge of gas that had collected in the cylinder exploded and the bar struck Tarkin on the head, crushing his skull. He leaves a widow and two children.

SECRET BRIDE TALKS TOO MUCH IN SLEEP

NEW YORK, Jan. 19.—Mrs. David A. Christian, formerly Miss Helen Greves, talks in her sleep. That is why her marriage, which she tried to keep secret, is now known to her family. She was living at the Greves home in Grandford, N. J. The young woman muttered her husband's name as she slept. Her sister, who slept with her, heard her words and told her mother. Then the bride admitted all. She said she was married three months ago to David A. Christian of Elizabeth, N. J., by the Rev. J. V. Ellison. They wanted to keep the wedding secret until they could furnish a home. Mrs. Christian now resides at the home of the bridegroom's parents.

WOMAN AMBULANCE SURGEON

NEW YORK, Jan. 20.—Dr. Elizabeth A. Bruyn has just been appointed as surgeon in the ambulance corps in Brooklyn. At the Williamsburg Hospital she was the recipient of many congratulations. To all she declared she had no doubt but that she would like her work, despite the fact that as an ambulance surgeon she may be called out at any hour of the day or night. Like her sister surgeon, Dr. Mary Crawford, she is a graduate of the Cornell Medical School, having completed her studies there last year, though she is only twenty-two years of age.

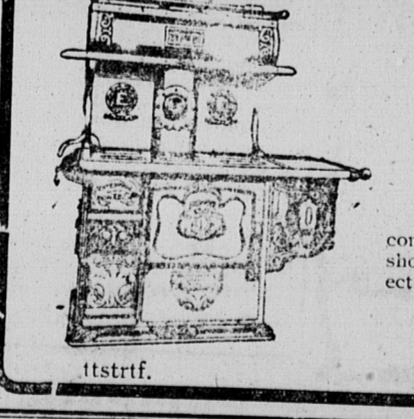
GEORGIAN CANAL TOO BIG

SYDNEY, N. S., Jan. 20.—J. H. Plummer, president of the Dominion Coal Company, is in Sydney and will remain for several days. In speaking of the proposed Georgian Bay Canal, which would connect the exportation of Cape Breton coal into the middle west, Mr. Plummer said to a Canadian Press representative that he did not expect to see the Georgian Bay Canal completed in his life time. It would bring business to the Cape Breton industries, he said, but was too big an undertaking for Canada at present, though he thought it would be of more advantage to Cape Breton than the Hudson Bay route. WIRELESS EQUIPMENT FOR TIDAL BOAST

OTTAWA, Jan. 20.—The Minister of Marine will bring down a bill in the Commons in regard to wireless telegraphy on ships. The bill will be along the same lines as the bill which E. N. Lewis already has on the order paper and will require all passenger steamers in tidal waters and on the great lakes, over a stated capacity, to install a wireless equipment.

CADILLAC, Mich., Jan. 19.—Though Henry Cottrell, his wife and two children were caught and buried under the burning ruins of their farm home near Dearfield, Isabella county, Sunday night, when 16 pounds of dynamite exploded in their attic, they are all alive today to tell the tale and not one suffered any injury more serious than painful bruises.

BEFFALO, Jan. 19.—Colonel William Baker, known among circus people as the giant, because of his seven feet seven inches height and 250 pounds weight, died at noon from the effects of a fall last night on an icy sidewalk. 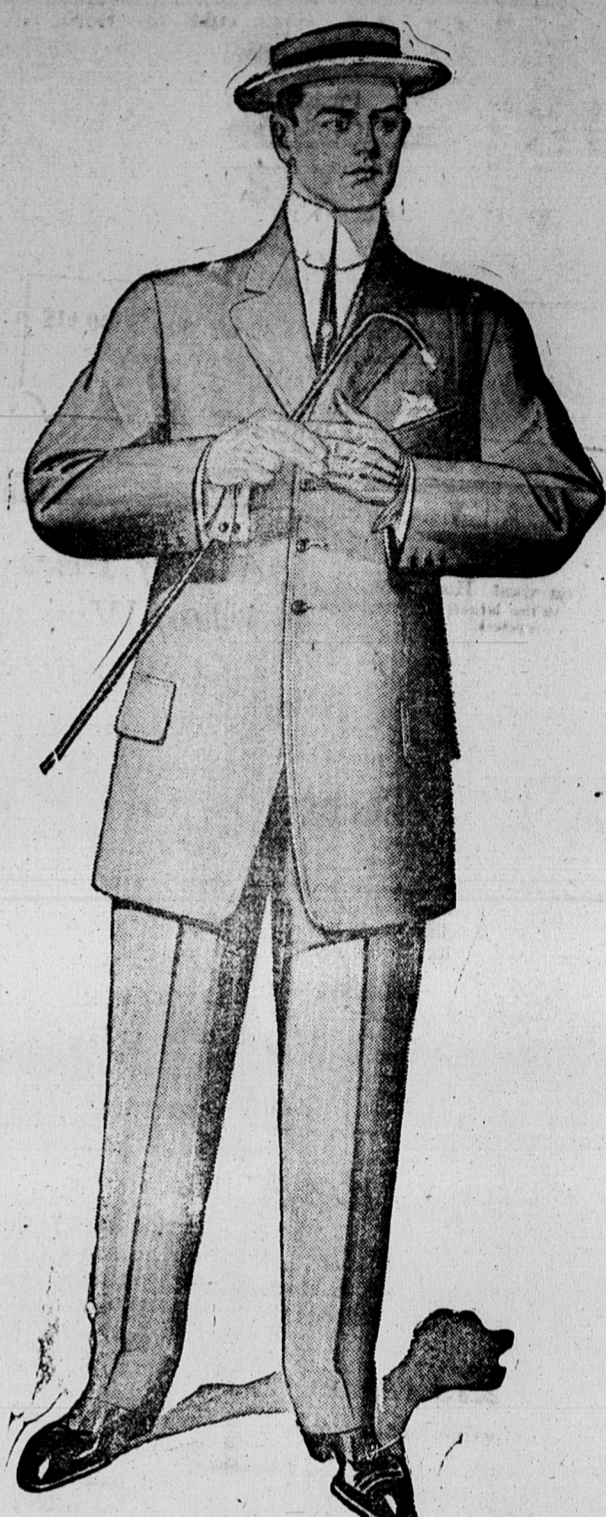
