Big Turnover In Mining Shares

TORONTO, Aug. 18—(CP)—The Toronto Stock Exchange had its first 1,000,000-share day since July 3 and the largest volume of trading since June 24, in a flurry of secondary gold led by Eldora.

Volume for the day was 1,340,000 shares of which Eldora accounted for 384,000.

On the day upturn among the golds well outnumbered the losses. The exchange's closing index showed gains up 12 at 112.81, base metals up 45 at 82.26 and western oils up 31 at 27.67.

Eldora's spurge followed announcement of a new underwriting agreement. Other golds marking successes on the day included Apex, 1-1-2; Armistice 7; Beaulieu 1 on a 124,000-share turnover; Bevercort 4; Campbell 5; Dexter 7; Donald 4; Duvay 2; East Malartic 5; Elder 5; God's Lake 4 1-2; Hosco 5; Norbelle 4 1-2; Penrey 1 1-2; Pickle 5; Samnorr 2 1-2 and Sullivan 4. Senior golds mostly showed gains.

Western oils were also active with Anglo-Canadian, British Dominion and Calmont showing gains and Calgary and Edmonton, Delnorbelle taking mild recessions. Base metals also moved with smelters up 1-2. East Sullivan 10, Labrador 30, Noranda 1-4 and Normal 1. Sherritt was down 10.

GO AHEAD WITH THAT PAINT JOB

If you have a painting job on hand let over from spring, now's the right time to go ahead with it. The warm, dry air of summer has drawn away the moisture from paintable surfaces, further it will help to dry the coatings of paint as you apply them. But there are some special do's and don'ts for summer painting that you should follow to be sure of accomplishing an attractive lasting job.

First of all, when you paint outdoors, watch out for that summer sunshine! Don't apply paint in hot sunlight, or when the surface temperature is such that there will be any likelihood of blistering. In fact, your painting in the shade, for greater comfort and better results.

To avoid the sun, start to work on the west side of the house in early morning and work around to the east side by afternoon. Paint on the south side in early morning or late afternoon. You can paint the north side any time you want. Incidentally, if you use white paint in bright light, it may be helpful to wear dark glasses for protection against glare.

On cloudy days you can choose whatever sequence you please. But cloudy days—and bright days too—sometimes mean windy weather, and this brings up another precaution. Don't paint outdoors in a wind! Many a first-class paint job has been ruined by specks of dust or dirt blown onto the drying surface.

Ventilation can be controlled indoors and therein lies another advantage to painting in summer. Those windows and doors which are protected by screens against insects can be kept open day and night, and a slight draft will facilitate quick drying of freshly applied coatings.

Of course, the same precautions that apply for painting in other seasons, also hold good for summer. These include making sure the surface is dry, and thoroughly cleaned and prepared; mixing the paint thoroughly according to the directions on the can; and applying it carefully, with every stroke of the brush.
