Eddie Tremblay Wins From Ernie McIntyre In Ellsworth

Large Crowds see Wonderful fight—McIntyre Has Shave Over Sailor in First Six, but Tremblay Jay in 11th Proves Fatal to Colored Flash—Ellsworth Mayor Stops Fight in 12th Round with McIntyre on the Ropes—Tremblay Opens to Meet any Middleweight in the World.

BANGOR, August 4.—Nearly a thousand boxing fans attended the first mitt show that has been held in Ellsworth in ten years yesterday afternoon at Hancock Hall and there they saw Eddie Tremblay of Boston and the Navy beat Ernie McIntyre of Bangor. Up until the 11th round the affair was about an even thing, both boys handling the fans a real boxing attraction with plenty of science and pep mixed up, but beginning with the tenth round the punishment to the colored flash but not enough to distress the Chaisson boy to any extent. It was in the eleventh frame when the Maine middleweight champ stepped into a right jab and went to the mat in a dazed condition. Tremblay, famous for such a pack, had hit a blow that determined the winner of the bout. McIntyre went to the mat but showed his gameness by getting up as quick as he went down. He was in a dazed condition and fagged to cover up until the gong sent him back to the corner.

Windward Loses To Jock's Hayseed In Chester Race

CHESTER, August 4.—Hayseed IV, imported this year from New York by C. M. Jock of Chester and Halifax, won by forty four seconds corrected time from R. A. Corbett's Windward, of Halifax in the first of the series here today for the Chester Basin Challenge Cup. Linnet, Dixie, Raven, Caprice and Mary S., all of Chester, followed in the order named. Two victories are necessary for the winning of the cup.

Tyron, L. V. Smith, won the opening race of a similar series for this year's ownership of a trophy donated by the Chester Bay Yacht Club for competition among the "Star" class yachts of the Royal Nova Scotia Squadron. Her elapsed time was 4 hours, 53 minutes, 47 seconds and she was followed by Scut 11, C. E. Nash 4:56.02, L'Hirondelle, Murray Greene 4:55.45 Buccaneer and Viking.

L'Hirondelle finished flying a protest flag and claimed that Tyron had not rounded one of the buoys. The protest will be heard by the combined sailing committees of the Halifax and Chester Clubs.

The course for today's Challenge Cup event lead from Front Harbor to Refuse Head, thence to Blanford to Clay Island, to Refuse Head and to finish at Front Harbor. The wind was mostly southerly, light and fluctuating. I divided its favors alternately between Hayseed and Windward.

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Produce Merchants' Association Meeting in Montreal

At a meeting of the Montreal Produce Merchants' Association, held in Montreal on Wednesday, August 2nd, the following resolution was passed:—

RESOLVED that all purchases of farm products, such as butter, cheese and eggs, purchased on and after this date, shall be paid under the present transaction Stamp Tax on the basis of deducting the excess Stamp Tax at time of payment.

IT WAS FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be sent to all the Cheese and Butter Boards in Canada and also to each member of the Produce Association, with the request that they notify their buyers and shippers accordingly.

In publishing a copy of this resolution, the Association also states that buyers will still have to bear the Stamp Tax duty on all sales they make to England and, as a matter of fact, this Stamp Tax on each transaction under the present system, seems to be paid three times, over, viz:—

- 1.—By the seller in the country, on bills of exchange when the goods are sold to Great Britain or elsewhere.
- 2.—By the Montreal Merchant on bills of exchange when the goods are sold to Great Britain or elsewhere.
- 3.—By the handler of the business in the country when dividend cheques are paid for milk or cream sent to the factory.

The Association feels that the farmers ought to take this matter up vigorously with the Minister of Finance in order to obtain relief, and it is sure that any such movement on the part of the farmers will receive the hearty support of the Montreal Produce Merchants' Association, if their assistance be required.

The Association finds it difficult to believe that it was the intention of the Minister of Finance that this tax should be paid three times on the one transaction.

Dr. Noble Makes Rough Prediction

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 5.—Within thirty days Southern Europe, Northern Africa and the whole of Asia will be destroyed by earthquakes and the residents of these countries will all be killed.

This is the latest prediction of Dr. M. A. Nobles, a physician and geologist who has studied volcanic disturbances since his graduation from Syracuse University in 1881. The Western section of the United States beyond the Rockies Mountains is also on Dr. Nobles' schedule of disaster.

"The eruption that will wipe out Europe will occur near Budapest, where there are at present seventy volcanoes," Dr. Nobles said.
