SCHOONER IN TROUBLE.—The C. G. S. Brant was on Tuesday night sent to the rescue of the schooner James A. Garland, which in the gale that was then raging had got caught under the Hillsborough Bridge and was in some danger of being wrecked. Immediately on the intimation reaching Capt. Taylor, Agent of Marine, he ordered the Brant out and she had to take part of her lighthouse supplies from the after deck to make room for the large towing hawser that had to be used. After some trouble a line was put aboard the disabled vessel and she was successfully towed to a safe anchorage.

THE SITUATION IN MEXICO
WASHINGTON, July 15.—Although the resignation of General Huerta is confidently expected by the State Department and Washington diplomats to occur at any moment, the Constitutionalists, unaffected by the news, are pressing hard their military campaign on Mexico City. Official despatches revealed that General Villa, with 15,000 men, was ready for a rapid advance on the Mexican Capital and that General Oregon's forces at Guadalajara were prepared to sweep forward within a few days. Although officials have not been given much to predict, they now firmly believe the Constitutionalists will be in Mexico City in two or three weeks, regardless of what the Huerta Government may do.

HOPE TO PREVENT FIGHTING.
Diplomats are working hard to prevent fighting in the Capital and still hope that the transfer of power to the Constitutionalists may be effected without further bloodshed. General Huerta's resignation, it is realized, would not immediately compose the situation, but it would make possible parleys with the Constitutionalists through which a change of Government could be accomplished peacefully.

WASHINGTON, July 15.—With Huerta's family and several close friends in flight today from Mexico City his resignation is expected at any time. While Huerta may leave the capital today some think that he is sending his family away while he stays to head the troops in the last stand against the Constitutionalists. The belief is whatever Huerta does, Constitutionalists will be in Mexico City in a few weeks.

TOP-DRESSING ROOTS.
Root crops, besides those attacked by fly, require top-dressing. Mangels always want it, as they can use plenty of nitrogen, and with them may be mentioned cabbages and thousand-headed kale, although not root crops. Swedes and turnips less often want a nitrogenous top-dressing, unless affected by fly. For the other crops mentioned two top-dressings are often desirable, unless very heavily dunged. The first should be given just after sowing the crop, and the second, if required, about a month later. Thus the crop is fed gradually throughout its growth, which is much better than giving a heavier dose at one time. Each dressing may consist of 1 cwt. per acre nitrate of soda. Sometimes this is mixed with an equal amount of common salt, which makes it easier to distribute, and is of some benefit to mangels and cabbages on light land. The first dressing may be given only along the rows, if liked, but this is a mistake with the second dose, which should be broadcast all over the surface, as the fibrous roots are everywhere by this time. Any farmer who has plenty of liquid manure can use this instead for his roots, distributing it with an equal bulk of water, unless it includes a lot of rain-water from the roofs.—English Farm and Home.

MANURES FOR CORN.
Those who are sowing maize as a fodder crop should see that the land is well manured, and this heavy-yielding crop naturally makes big demands on the soil. If a dressing of farmyard manure was given in advance of sowing, all that is wanted at seed-time is 2 cwt. superphosphate per acre, followed by a top-dressing of 1½ cwt. nitrate of soda after the crop is up. Failing any yard manure, the dressing at seed-time may be 4 cwt. of a good nitro-phosphoric guano, or a mixture of 3 cwt. superphosphate, 1 cwt. sulphate of ammonia, and 1 cwt. on light land, 2 cwt. kainit, followed by the top-dressing as before.—Farm and Home.

HEAVY STORM IN SOUTHERN STATES
NEW ORLEANS, July 15.—There was an unprecedented rainfall of more than 9 inches in three hours. During the storm 31 coal barges at Oldell Louisiana sunk. At Raleigh, N. C., a loss of \$100,000 was caused.

CUTTING THE ALFALFA CROP.
An alfalfa field to remain thrifty must be cut at the proper time. When the new shoots begin to appear around the crowns it is a signal that the crop is ready to cut for hay. These basal shoots usually appear at the beginning of blooming period, although dry weather may retard their growth. If alfalfa is cut before the young shoots appear, the succeeding cutting is likely to be materially reduced. If allowed to stay too long, the stems become woody and the hay deteriorates in quality. Forty per cent. of the hay is leaves and 25 to 30 per cent. of the protein of the entire plant is found in the leaves. And the condition in which the percentage of leaves is lowered or the amount of protein is lessened means deterioration in the quality of the hay. Alfalfa can be taken off each year under various North Dakota conditions.—North Dakota Farmers' Institute.

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
