The letter is very interesting and contains graphic accounts of his visits to several cities. The country he describes as hilly though well adapted to farming. He saw crops of oats there that surpasses anything on the island. Barley also is extensively grown. He paid a visit to Scotland and while there visited several messes which contained many historical relics, principally weapons of war. All were hung up and each had its particular history, giving the dates and names of the battles in which they were used. He visited Westminster Abbey and there saw monuments of ancient kings, places where Kings had been martyred, and many other places of historical interest. He visited London and there saw the tower and was greatly impressed by its immense size. These of course are only a few of the many things he saw, and he hopes to be able to give a more detailed account of his visits when he comes home. Many of the roads throughout the country are of cement, and the land is mostly all high land. At the time of his writing it had been decided to divide the 105th Batt. into drafts, the first of 280 men was about to go to the front then. But as has been reported in the Guardian this decision has since been cancelled. Writing in this connection he regretted very much that he was not of the crowd about to go to the front. British Capture German Trench

(Special to the Guardian) LONDON, Nov. 3.-British troops captured a German trench east of Guoncourt on the Somme front last night, and raided German trenches near Arras, says a British war office announcement. The Statement reads: "Yesterday evening by a surprise attack we captured an enemy trench east of Guoncourt and secured our positions during the night. We carried out a successful raid against enemy trenches near Arras."

HEAVY FIGHTING IN MACEDONIA.

The British official communication issued tonight with regard to the Macedonian front says: "On the Debran front there has been only artillery activity; on the Struma front our troops ambushed some enemy patrols near Salmalook and took them prisoners. Bursuk has been successfully bombarded by our airmen."
