(Continued from page 1) lars and costs to be recovered by summary conviction in the City Police Court of the Stipendiary Magistrate and in default of payment of such fine and costs it shall and may be lawful for the said Magistrate to commit the offender or offenders to the common jail of the said city for any period not exceeding thirty days unless the said penalty and costs be sooner paid. 4—Any parent or guardian may be summoned before the said Stipendiary Magistrate for permitting his child to habitually violate this by-law and may be fined or summarily convicted for the first offence \$1 without costs and the second offence \$2 and for the third or any subsequent offence \$5 and in default of payment of any such fine to be imprisoned in the common jail of the said city for a period not exceeding in the case of a first offence five days, a second offence ten days and a third or subsequent offence fifteen days, unless

said fine be sooner paid. A letter was read from Mr. Hogg, proprietor of the People's Theatre, protesting against the act and maintaining that the strict censorship of the films, their educational value and the grand order of the theatre were conducive to much good to young children, many of whom had cheerless homes, and on motion was ordered to lie on the table.

A delegation from the P. E. I. Telephone Company composed of H. J. Palmer, President, W. S. Grant, Manager, and R. M. Johnson, of the Board of Directors, with Mr. Winfield of the Nova Scotia Company was present and were heard respecting their proposal to lay underground cables. J. H. Palmer spoke first stating briefly the object of their visit and introducing Mr. Winfield. That gentleman in a very comprehensive and lucid address explained matters to the council. He stated that the company were not actuated by any other motives than to afford Charlottetown the very best telephone facilities obtainable and at the same time minimize line troubles in the local exchange. Illustrating what this change would mean here he said that with aerial lines the Halifax exchange had reduced its annual average of interruptions from two days per phone to one hour and fifteen minutes. He referred to the possibilities of the Charlottetown exchange with a remodelled and improved building thoroughly modern switchboard and up-to-date equipment and thought the council should co-operate with the company when it expressed its willingness to make a considerable outlay to improve the service.

After some discussion as to the effect of the conduit being placed under the macadamized streets and an answer was promised in one week's time.

Following this Health Officer Johnson spoke regarding health matters. The time of the year was approaching when something should be done toward providing means for the disposal of the city's refuse. He spoke of an incinerator but emphasized the purchase of land as more within the city's means. Of inspection of milk he thought the new act should be enforced on its coming with effect on May 1st and suggested that steps be taken towards its enforcement. He deplored the fact that under the present system of meat inspection the good product was exported and the remainder, irrespective of quality as far as inspection was concerned, was left for P. E. Island consumers. He thought that now that the bylaws were there they should be enforced.

The general tone of the meeting seemed to be in accordance with the Health officer's views.

Council will meet this morning to pass the new children's bylaw.

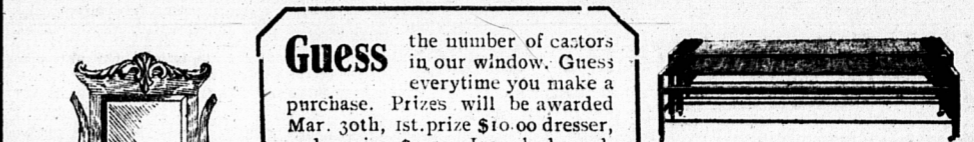

BANK FAILS

LONDON, March 22—The 'Times' Vienna correspondent says: "The Hungarian Amortizement Bank, whose president, M. De Szivak, committed suicide yesterday, has suspended payment. Its exact liabilities are not known. Many of the bills in its portfolio are said to be forged signatures.

It is feared that the liquidation will involve not only loss but discredit for some financial and political circles of the Hungarian capital.
