Outlook For World Wheat Crop Reviewed

OTTAWA, May 6 - (CP) - The world wheat production picture is discouraging. The Bureau of Statistics said today the outlook for the new world wheat crop, to be grown and harvested this year, is "somewhat less promising" than it was a year ago.

It said the United States, with acreage in excess of last year's and generally favorable growing conditions, should equal and perhaps beat its 1948 production of 1,285,000,000 bushels.

But prospects in Canada were not so favorable. In Western Canada, moisture deficiency is causing concern. It generally has been conceded that some increase in wheat acreage would take place. However, prairie moisture deficiencies may force some modification of seeding plans.

There were dismal prospects of serious grasshopper infestations. However, the Bureau said, improved weather conditions could "do much to offset the effects of both factors."

In Europe, a smaller seeded acreage of winter wheat and lack of adequate rainfall indicate a reduction in the output of wheat from the 1948 level. In the Southern Hemisphere, seeding is progressing in Australia and Argentina under generally favorable conditions and there have been no indications to date of any appreciable changes in acreage from last year.

New Hint Russia Making General Change In Tactics

Reports that Greek Communists are seeking United Nations mediation in their war with Athens carry a strong suggestion that Russia really is making a general change in tactics. The Berlin blockade negotiations created an air of expectancy regarding Russian policy, but with widespread western recognition that one swallow does not make a summer, two swallows, however, double the chances.

In Prague the minister of justice of the Greek rebel government announced that he had written Herbert Ewart, president of the United Nations Assembly, suggesting mediation.

No mention was made of previous Communist demands that negotiations be preceded by withdrawal of Anglo-American military units, lending significance to what might otherwise be mere propaganda. Terms suggested were for an interim government composed of non-political figures acceptable to both sides, pending U. N.-supervised elections.

The Minister is quoted as saying that "the atmosphere of appeasement that has developed in recent weeks in the European scene makes peace seem possible."

He thus intimates that Russia has switched to a policy of appeasement. If there should now be some break in the deadlock over a peace treaty for Austria, or a move to open the Danube, the situation would be clear.

Temporary appeasement does not mean, however, that Russia is yielding in the cold war or in the pursuit of the ultimate aims of Communism. A change of methods which fail is always called for—in fact, demanded by Communist teachings. Change of intentions,

lever. If these moves mean, then, that Russia is seeking a truce merely to adopt more hopeful tactics, what are the possibilities for a real end of the cold war?

It may take unforeseen developments to answer that. Some observers feel peace cannot come until Communism is rooted out in Russia itself, even if that requires war.

I think it cannot come through force, that it can come only under a combination of these circumstances, among others:

1. When there are no great areas of social and economic unrest upon which Communism can feed, thus dulling it as a weapon for traditional Russian expansionism.

2. When Russia, through natural development of her own resources, stands as an equal to the big powers, no longer fearing them.

3. When, through these reductions in both internal and external pressure, there is no further excuse for totalitarianism and the people of Russia can assume the participation in their government which they have been promised.

Pending that, we have in Moscow a great concentration of power in the hands of fallible men who are dedicated to expansion of their own position through the undermining of all others, and Western measures of containment cannot be relaxed without grave danger.

Lifer Sentenced To Hang for Murder

MONTREAL, May 6 - (CP) - John Boyko, serving a life sentence for one murder, was convicted today of the chisel-slaying of a fellow-prisoner in penitentiary and sentenced to be hanged Aug. 26.

A jury in King's Bench Court took two hours before convicting the 62-year-old Ukrainian.

Last November Boyko stabbed Dominique Tedesco, 27, with a chisel in the carpentry shop of St. Vincent de Paul Penitentiary.

At the time he was serving a life sentence, commuted from death, for the fatal beating in 1947 of his

common-law wife. He claimed she had robbed him of the proceeds of a potato-chip business.
