Vegetables Come From Sunny South

(Special to The Guardian) SAINT JOHN, N. B., Feb. 27.—High tariffs and exchange are working out to the advantage of growers in the British West Indies. British West Indies early season produce reaches Saint John direct on Canadian National steamships vessels and has almost entirely replaced United States crops on the Saint John market, declared a leading green goods dealer of the city. The British West Indies vegetables have been arriving in good condition and have found a ready market. New cabbage is the latest arrival and is retailing at eight cents a pound. New beets brought fifteen cents a bunch, new carrots twenty-five to thirty cents. Bermuda celery sold at ten to fifteen cents a head and British West Indies tomatoes were bringing ten to twelve cents a pound. The increased trade with Canada in British West Indies fruits and vegetables has resulted in large orders being placed in Canada for the crates in which the fruits and vegetables are shipped and also wrappers for oranges.

THE ROCKY POINT ICE—The prevailing mild weather is very unfavorable to those situated across the river where traffic to the city is on the ice this season of the year. The high tide and wind cleared out the ice, releasing one of the floats, which drifted out of its position. Timely and strenuous efforts by a number of citizens succeeded in bringing it safely to shore, otherwise it would have drifted out the harbor.

AROSTOOK JUNCTION, Feb. 27.—(By the Canadian Press)—Saying they and their families were hungry and demanding provisions from the local stores, 25 to 30 men marched into Arostook Junction this afternoon from the California settlement district, near the border of Maine. 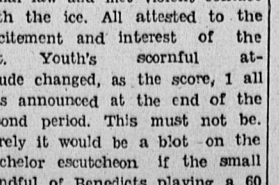
