The latest news, first of all.
Rev. F. L. Connolly, Alberton, is in the city.

P. W. McLeod, Mt Stewart, was in the city yesterday registering at the Revere.

There will be no preaching in the Baptist church at Bonshaw and Tryon on Sunday next.

Dr F. S. Coffin, Phd, Missionary to Trinidad, is now on furlough and will spend several weeks in this city.

Rev. E. McDougall will preach Sabbath, Aug. 7th, at Murray River at 10.30 and 6.30 and at Peters Road at 2.30.

Rev. Mr. and Mrs. Fields, Tryon were in the city yesterday on their way to spend a few weeks in Montague.

George E. and Mrs. Leard, Cra-paud, were in the city yesterday and left in the afternoon on a visit to Pisiquid.

Coal arrivals for A. Pickard & Co. yesterday were schooner Daisy with Inverness round and Sir Wilfrid with Acadia nut.

Rev K. J. Grant, D. D., formerly missionary to Trinidad has arrived in this city and will occupy the pulpit of Zion Church during the month of August.

Mrs. Neil Shaw, Brackley Point, has returned after an extended trip to Edmonton. On her return trip she paid a visit to her brother B. Toombs of Moncton.

Among the outward passengers from this city yesterday were: Michael Bradley to New York, Frank McKearney to Sydney, Ed. Allen to Oxford, N.S., Rev. Dr. Hunt to St. Eleanor, F. B. Armour of Alberton to Halifax, Russel Watson to Halifax.

There was a large attendance at the market yesterday and prices remain as last quoted. Fruit, with the exception of raspberries and blueberries, were plentiful and met ready sale. New hay sold at 35 to 40 cents per cwt. and old at 50 cents; potatoes 50 to 55 cents.

A party in Hopfield has lost a bag of money. The bag contained about one hundred dollars in five, ten, twenty and fifty cent pieces, mostly twenty cent pieces. There are one or two rumours concerning the probable finding of the money, but all are unconfirmed though some are of a decidedly suspicious nature.

The Montreal Star says three men whose amateur standing is being investigated are Cameron, of Amherst; Corkery, of Toronto, and Frank Lukeman, all three of whom are known here. The question is as to whether the expense money received by them for the various jaunts participated in was not in excess of that allowed. The Corkery case is being handled in Toronto, and details are being withheld there, but some inkling as to his trouble has come from the lower provinces. A Halifax despatch says: M. P. A. A. A. wrote here inquiring as to the amount paid Cameron and Corkery for Halifax race, which is reported to be \$75 for expenses for themselves and trainer. A Charlottetown despatch says: The M. P. A. A. A. are investigating Cameron and Corkery's standing for some time, but President Johnson says their policy is to make sure of their grounds before taking action; otherwise by premature or unjustified suspension an athlete may be subjected to considerable inconvenience and loss. As to value of evidence received, they were non-committal. An Amherst despatch says: "No doubt the report from outside has been caused by Cameron's continuous victories and growing popularity as a clean sport." The results in the cases of Corkery and Cameron are not yet known, but Dr. Tees, chairman of the Registration committee of the A. A. U. of Canada, says that Lukeman's case was investigated and that he was fully exonerated. Tuesday's Montreal Herald says: The writer was assured this morning by a gentleman who holds a high official position in both the Provincial and Dominion Amateur Athletic Unions that the cases of Corkery and Lukeman have been looked into at length, and everything found to be square and above board. The case of Fred. Cameron has not been decided, and the A.A.U. of Canada is still awaiting a report from the Maritime Provinces A. A. U.
