Man Who Assaulted Priests Found Insane

MONTREAL, May 8 (CP)—Charged with attempted murder in connection with the stabbing of a priest and a religious brother March 9, 30-year-old Marcel Julien today was declared mentally unfit to stand trial by a Court of King's Bench jury.

Julien will be detained in the criminally insane section of the Montreal jail.

Julien allegedly struck Rev. Jacques Brassard with a large knife on the mid-town Lavall Avenue on the night of March 8, and a few hours later, attacked Brother Vincent A. Cariveau on east-end Deformier Avenue. Both victims recovered.

Ship Loads 103,000 Bags Of Potatoes At Summerside

The 6,000-ton Swedish motor ship Stig Gorthon sailed from Summerside yesterday with approximately 103,000 one-hundred pound bags of potatoes for Britain but she was minus four of her crew, three Italians and a native of Holland, who deserted here. The police have been advised and if caught they will be turned over to the immigration authorities for being in the country illegally.

The Stig Gorthon will proceed to Georgetown to complete her cargo. Since she docked last Friday a twenty-four hour a day schedule for loading has been maintained when weather permitted. During that time upwards of \$3,000 has been disbursed in wages to longshoremen. She also carries 780 pounds of used clothing for the people in the flooded areas of Britain, donated by the people of Summerside in response to an appeal from the I.O.D.E. and the Mayor and Town Council. This clothing will be carried freight free.

No sooner had the Stig Gorthon left port when she was replaced at the Marine wharf by the Borjeson, a 3,400 ton ship owned by the same Swedish Company. She docked at 2:30 p.m. and loading had commenced at 3:30. This ship will carry her second shipment of potatoes to Britain, having come direct from Southampton where she discharged a cargo taken on earlier this spring at Georgetown. A third ship is expected in about a week's time.—S.

Ontario Union Protests Workers From N. S.

TORONTO, May 8 (CP)—The Cleaners and Dyers Union (A.F.L.) announced tonight it has forwarded to the Federal Labor Department a protest against what it called the action of certain employers in the Toronto dyeing and cleaning industry in bringing in "cheap labor" from Nova Scotia.

Harry Simon, union organizer, charged that one Toronto firm this week brought in 15 girls from Nova Scotia, paying them \$17 a week less \$2 to cover the cost of their transportation from Halifax.

Ontario Labor Minister Daley said the Province had no jurisdiction in such a matter, so long as wages conform to the Ontario minimum scale.

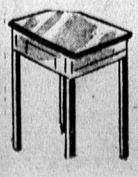

N. S. Education Committee Reports

HALIFAX, May 8 (CP)—Loans to some provincial normal school students to cover substantially all expenses while in training at the school at Truro, N.S., were advocated in an education committee report tabled in the Legislature today. Loans now are available to cover a part of expenses.

The committee recommended that such loans be granted for a longer period than the present two years. Scholarships for high school students wishing to enter the school also were urged.

Further recommendations:

1. Appointment of assistant school inspectors in certain counties where inspectors are overburdened; and
2. Provisions for instruction in lower grade schools on value, care and preservation of forests.

The committee reported that preliminary plans have been made for establishment of Sydney and New Glasgow, N.S., vocational high schools. Tenders were called for one in Halifax and others were planned in Yarmouth and Annapolis.

St. John River Continues In Flood

FREDERICTON, May 8 (CP)—With the rising St. John river beyond the 20-foot mark above summer low level, reports tonight revealed a foot of water over the main highway near Florenceville, north of Hartland, while the river continued to rise at Woodstock.

Across the river from Woodstock, the main road to Southampton was blocked by submerging of a bridge, and water also covered the approach to Woodstock's island park, where a race track is situated.

Prorogation Of N. S. House Not Likely This Week

HALIFAX, May 8 (CP)—Premier Macdonald told the Nova Scotia Legislature today that important legislation still to come up would likely delay prorogation expected this week-end—until early next week.

He said that with a large number of bills still to go before the committee of the whole House and the important measures relating to trade unions, fishermen and marketing not yet referred back from committee he looked on the possibility of finishing House business tomorrow "with very great doubt."

House sit Saturday and Monday afternoon rather than give members a long week-end before a normal Monday night session. Mr. Macdonald said he would have no objections to any arrangements made in accordance with the wishes of the House but committees might require the free Saturday period for consideration of bills.

The Premier, asked following the sitting whether the delay had any bearing on prospects for a taxation agreement with the Dominion, had no comment. It was learned that if an agreement were reached House ratification would be sought.

Clue To Missing Plane Fizzles Out

VANCOUVER, May 8 (CP)—One more possible clue to the disappearance of the Trans-Canada Airlines transport, with 15 persons aboard, fizzled out today when T.C.A.F. officials said that a jagged piece of metal recovered from Burrard Inlet did not come from the lost airliner, but was part of a service aircraft which crashed in 1942.

The eight-inch square piece of metal was recovered by Gordon Wilson, a fisherman and former air force maintenance man, who identified it as being from a plane.

With the exploding of the latest clue, the search swung back to the Georgia Straits, being combed by divers and dragged by dredging crews, but so far naval authorities report "nothing found."
