Mr. and Mrs. P. L. Coffin, Savage Harbour, were visitors to Murray River, recently. Z

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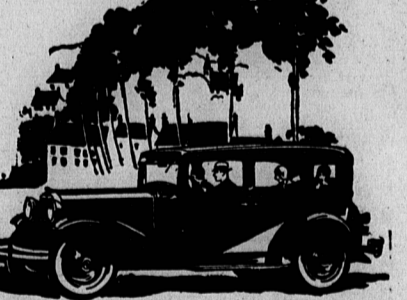
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
