Annual Meeting Abegweits Club Held Last Night

Last night in the Board of Trade rooms the Annual meeting of the Abegweit Athletic Association was held. There was a large and enthusiastic gathering of the fans of the different lines of sport present and from the interest shown by young and old alike, there is every prospect for a better year in the line of athletics in our province than in the past year.

Mr. S. F. Doyle, President of the Abegweit Club occupied the chair, the Secretary being absent. Mr. Geo. L. Prowse was appointed Secretary for the meeting. The minutes of the last regular meeting were read and on motion adopted.

This was followed by the President's report which outlined the past year's work of the club, taking individually the splendid record of the hockey team, Baseball and Track teams, concluding with thanking on behalf of the club His Honour the Lieutenant Governor, His Worship Mayor Jenkins and the citizens in general for the hearty co-operation extended the Abegweit Club on all occasions.

The Treasurer's report followed, which was thorough in every detail and showed the association to be on a good sound financial basis, notwithstanding the slight deficit of some three hundred dollars. This report was unanimously adopted, including a hearty vote of thanks to the Treasurer, Mr. F. P. Hennessey, who was received with good grace. Mr. Hennessey, assuming the meeting it was only a pleasure to work for the Abegweit, who were always upholders and promoters of good clean sport.

Councillor T.W.L. Prowse next outlined the terms of the Morton Thompson Trophy and with a few well chosen remarks, presented the beautiful trophy to the President, Mr. Doyle, who in turn, called upon Mayor Jenkins to present the Trophy to the captain of the team, Mr. Fred Moore, to hold until returned to the Trustee Mr. T.W.L. Prowse.

Mr. F.P. Hennessey then gave an account of the work accomplished on the Stand, Grounds and Club building, which the splendid work of the Abegweit Track Teams, winners of the Maritime championship and of the Maritime record now held by Mr. Wm. Halpeny and Mr. Phillip McDonald.

Dr. Yeo followed with a brief address on the successes attained by the Abegweits.

Mr. Healy F. Duregan, the next speaker, after the usual complimentary terms, assured the Abegweit Club and the members who took an active part in the different branches of sport, that he felt sure that every citizen was behind the Abegweit Club, and that anything he could do to still further the interests of the club, financially or otherwise, he would be only happy to do so.

Mr. Thomas White, in his remarks, congratulated the club and its various teams on their many victories, but was in some doubt as to why there should be a deficit from hockey.

President Doyle answered Mr. White's question, that owing to the Abegweits being compelled to play two consecutive games at home, had a tendency to lessen the house on the second performance, also that the Abegweits' trips were of from four to five days away from home, and the necessity of a play-off and more additional expense. However, he assured Mr. White, that this season would be only single games, and a place had been left in the league for Summerside, which would mean greater financial assistance to the clubs.

Mr. Elmer Ritchie in his remarks, referred to the necessity of having a proper coach, and thought this matter should have careful consideration from the club, if they hoped to retain the Morton-Thompson Trophy or to play for the Allan cup. On motion by Dr. Yeo, Mr. H.W. Buntain, Mayor Jenkins and Thomas White were appointed a committee to act in conjunction with the Abegweit Executive to consider ways and means of obtaining a coach for the coming winter.
