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Successful Sports And Parade on Monday

Splendid Weather And a Large Attendance At The C. A. A. Grounds. At the Labor Day Sports.

The Labor Day celebration in Charlottetown Monday was very successful. The weather was ideal for the holiday and the day's programme was most enthusiastically carried out.

The feature of the forenoon was the L. P. U. parade which started from the Hall on Water Street and proceeded through the principal streets back to the starting point. The parade was headed by a motor car containing officers of the L. P. U. This was followed by a line of cars, motor trucks, and several horse drawn vehicles gaily decorated.

Worthy of special mention was the truck in which was placed the large life boat of the Navy League. It was manned by members of the Charlottetown Life Saving Crew and number of the Naval Brigade, and was escorted by a detachment of the Brigade on foot. A number of business firms were represented in the parade with decorated vehicles, including the Perfection Ice Cream, Currie and Murnaghan, Carvell Bros., Mc Laine Service Station and the Charlottetown Milling Co.

There were several clowns on bicycles and also a Charlie Chaplin. The parade which was accompanied by 4th Regiment band attracted much admiring attention along the line of march.

The decoration of vehicles meant considerable expenditure of time and labor and the effort was very picturesque. The committee in charge are to be commended on the splendid result of their efforts.

The sports in the afternoon were largely attended and well contested, the obstacle race furnishing fun galore, especially for the young lads, who were taking a day to themselves and trying to make things as unpleasant as possible for others.

The boys of to-day should appreciate being allowed into the Labor sport free of charge by the Management of the Abegweit Grounds. Years ago all small boys were not allowed inside the gate, possibly the boys would like the management to adopt this method in future. Better behavior on the part of boys is expected.

The half mile run had only two starters, Harley receiving a big handicap on Francis, the Indian runner from Lennox Island, who won in magnificent style, breaking the track record made in 1900 by Johnston when he defeated L. B. McMillan of this city in 2 minutes 56 sec. Francis clipping one quarter second off.

The high jump was the next closest event, Halpenny pushing Kilroy to 5 feet 7.34 inches which also means a new record for the Abegweit track.

Frank made a neat jump and in a few years will no doubt hang up a Maritime record.

The pole vault was also a hand-picked event and was won in good style by the veteran jumper Wm. Halpenny, who went to 11 ft. He tried to clear the bar at 11 feet 6 inches. Mr. Halpenny took two trials grazing the bar each trial. He was later to take his final trial but owing to the number of events to be run off it was left over. Mr. Halpenny will leave this morning for the championship meet at Halifax Sept. 9th, where he will again lead the way and it is confidently expected will put a new figure in this event.

The 100 yards also furnished a close finish between E. McGuigan and L. Wedlock, McGuigan winning out, which was reversed in the 220 dash, Wedlock breasting the tape first McGuigan a close second.

The 4 round boxing contest no decision gave the fans a good idea of the many art of self defence. The boxers were evenly matched.
