SUPREME COURT

July 4, 1903.
The case of McDonald vs. Dodds, an action of ejectment, heard before Mr Justice Fitzgerald, occupied the attention of the Court all yesterday and this forenoon. Judgment was reserved.

A. A. McLean, K. C., and J. A. Mathieson, for plaintiff; W. A. O. Morson, K. C., D. O. McLeod, K. C., and W. E. Bentley, for defendant.

In the case of McDonald vs. Dodds, D. C. McLeod moved a non suit on the ground that the deed which formed the muniment of title had improperly reserved the life estates, and was therefore in that respect void so that the defendants had always held by adverse possession and not under the deed, the Statute of Limitations had run and they had now acquired a title by peaceable possession. The plaintiff in his deed had only acquired a right of entry. This he did not exercise in time to prevent the Statute of Limitation from running and now his remedy was gone. Mr. Morson followed with further argument. Mr. Mathieson on behalf of the plaintiff argued that the lease (which was unregistered but brought into Court by the plaintiff) gave the life estates properly and that the defect in the deed were thereby cured, The Court although not granting the non-suit reserved leave to move again and withheld judgment in the case.

In the case of McEachern vs. Wheat, judgment of respondent ouster, that is that the defendant have leave to plead over again, was given Saturday. It seems that the defendant had pleaded a plea in abatement of the present action on the ground that a writ had already been issued against him by Isaac Lane for the same cause of action, but neglected to state that the action of Lane's was still pending. As this was a fatal error, the plaintiff replied by a plea of nul tiel record, and in the argument asked that final judgment be granted by the Court, The Chief Justice, however, gave judgment as above of respondent ouster with costs against the defendant; so that now the defendant on payment of costs will again plead to the action and the case will come on for hearing in due course.
